The need for a directory of Lake county became apparent for this very reason. So close are the business relations of the men in Gary with those of Indiana Harbor those of Indiana Harbor with those of East Chicago, those of East Chicago with those of Hammond and Crown Point that these cities are really like one great municipality.

When it became necessary for the business man in one of these cities to learn the address of a lawyer, a mechanic, or a business man in any other of the neighboring cities he had to do so by the word of mouth method. He had to ask someone if it or perhaps bother the telephone girl.

Will Cost But \$3.

Now he will be able to refer to his Lake county directory and learn all of the facts about that particular person which are usually found in a directory. He will have all of that valuable information at his elbow for the price of \$3 and there will not be a live business man in the region who will not avail himself of the opportunity.

For several weeks there has been a squad of men covering the towns of Lowell, Crown Point and other of the smaller towns in the south part of the county. These men will soon invade the cities of the northern part of the county and they expect to secure the names and addresses of 40,000 people before they are through with their work.

A very valuable thing about the work these men are doing is that of numbering or renumbering the houses in all of the towns in which they are securing data. In the cities where there is no free delivery the people are very careless about numbering their residences and they seem to prefer the country way of saying, "Jim Jones lives in 478 Commonwealth avenue."

To Be Illustrated.

The new directory will have 800 pages in it and will be profusely illustrated. There will be advertisements of all of the leading merchants and business men and there will be other valuable data.

Even the country districts are being covered by two men on motor-cycles and there will not be a farmer on a highway who will not be included in the book.

The work of getting out a book of this kind is a great undertaking and is in the hands of a capable directory man, John T. Powers, who is the manager of the company. The new directory is gotten out by a stock company, which is composed of some of the best-known men in the region. They have employed a man to get names who speaks eight languages and have two men on motorcycles going through the country.
