## SWears ANOTHER WARRANT

Lottie Rydecweski Makes Serious Charges in Sensational Ostrowski Case Now on Trial in South Chicago Courts.

## YOUNG WOMAN TELLS QUEER STORY

Says That Ostrowski Offered to Divorce His Wife Who Is Now Living in Hammond, Provided His Housekeeper Would Make Her Home With Him.

Sensational developments in the notorious Dr. Ostrowski case of South Chicago are coming thick and fast, and but for the statute of limitations the doctor would be entangled in a mess from which it would take him a long time to extricate himself.

As it is he and his attorney have a fight on their hands which if lost will result in a prison sentence.

Lottie Rydecweski, the young Polish woman, who claims to have been induced to come to this country by promises of the doctor, charging him with a criminal operation upon her. While the warrant is for a specific operation said to have been performed some time last November she says that he has performed three similar operations upon her.

Continued Until Oct. 10th.

Dr. Ostrowski's case was continued in the South Chicago court before Judge Lantry's court yesterday until Oct. 10. Judge Lantry will be downtown then, and the case will be taken to his court there. Three witnesses were examined yesterday, among them Lottie and Captain Halpin of the South Chicago police station.

Lottie testified that she had loaned \$300 to the doctor and that he had induced her to live with him, saying that he would divorce his lawful wife, who is now living in Hammond, that he made advances to her sister and that therefore left her.

Attorneys Clash Frequently.

Attorney Hughes, for the physician, and Attorney Peden, for the prosecutors, clashed frequently over the evidence to be submitted to the court, especially that of all the detailed evidence should be omitted. Judge Lantry, however, ordered Lottie to tell her story.

It also developed that Dr. Ostrowski had been made a defendant in the court in past years.

While practicing on Halsted and Madison streets he was charged with conspiracy, and with shooting a woman. It was further alleged that he finally got the woman to sign a statement that she herself inflicted the wound.

## GRIFFITH MAN INVENTS TOPPER

Peter Jansen Invents What He Believes Will Be Moneymaker.

Griffith, Ind., Oct. 3.—An onion topper is the latest successful invention to be put on the market by a Lake county man. The inventor is Peter Jansen of Griffith, who has spent considerable time in completing the device.

Like in many other cases, necessity was the mother of this invention, Mr. Jansen being interested in truck farming, in which the onion crop is of vital importance.

In Now a Nuisance.

One of the time-consuming drudgeries of finishing an onion crop is the topping of the plant. The topping consists in tying the long, hollow leaves of the plant into a knot, or clipping it off entirely to prevent the plant from going to seed.

The device that Mr. Jansen has invented will top a bushel of onions in a minute.

The inventor is about to form a stock company to put the invention on the market, and a meeting has been called for this purpose to take place next Wednesday evening in the Highland schoolhouse at 7:30 p. m.
