GARY CHURCH NEWS.

It is said that a Swedish Lutheran church will be established in Gary within a short time.

At a meeting of the members of the Swedish Lutherans of northwestern Indiana some time ago at Gary steps were taken to organize a church in Gary. There are quite a number of Swedish families in Gary at the present time, and the prospects for the establishment of a church are very bright.

Another meeting is scheduled to take place in the near future at Chesterton to further the organization of the church.

Work on the new \$2,000 German Evangelical church on Lincoln and Calumet avenues is progressing rapidly and the members of the church from Gary and Tolleston expect to be located in the new church before the first of the year. The pastor of the new church will be Rev. E. A. H. Kaser of Chesterton, Ind.

The congregation in the two towns is said to number over sixty members.

The young men of the Presbyterian church of Gary met at the home of the pastor last Tuesday evening for the purpose of organizing a young men's Bible class. Over twenty were present and steps were taken to organize the class. Refreshments were served and a pleasant evening was spent in social discourse.

GOOD GAME TOMORROW

Gary Football Team to Meet

Husky South Chicago-ans Sunday.

Tomorrow the citizens of Gary will have their first opportunity of witnessing the favorite American college game, football, played in their own city. The players will also be young men who have had college experience and have lived in the city for a number of months. The game will be played on the south side baseball grounds, which were known as the Cubs' park. Their adversaries will be the strong South Chicago team.

The lineup has not yet been selected for the game tomorrow, although the boys have been practicing hard all week. There are a number of new candidates for various positions and their work has made the lineup uncertain for tomorrow's game.

Owing to the fact that the boys have practiced harder this week than they have done in any week previous they believe that they can put up the hardest game of their lives. The last game they played they were snowed under by Valparaiso because they had had no training. Several of the men were knocked out, which showed their lack of condition. This time they expect to make a more favorable showing and the spectators will be given an interesting game to see even if the locals are beaten. A large attendance is desired by the team to help pay the expenses.

W. S. Feuer, owner of the Smith building and who lives in Cleveland, Ohio, arrived in Gary last night to renew his fight against the occupant of the building, E. G. Smith. The latter was given until next Monday by Judge Reiter to file a bond for the appealing of his case to the superior court. The previous bond was found to be no good by the judge and the latter demanded a new one and raised the amount from \$1,000 to \$3,000. If Smith fails to furnish this bond he will be compelled to move out of the Smith building Monday. Mr. Feuer is determined to have this matter settled at once so that he can move to Gary and begin business here.

To Voters of Gary

In order that the voters of Gary may know in what precinct they live and where they should go to vote, we publish the several precincts by boundaries with the location of their respective polling places.

The First precinct is all territory east of Virginia street, and extends from the Wabash railroad north to the lake, and the polling place is on the east side of Virginia street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues.

The Second precinct is bounded on

the east by Virginia street on the west by Broadway, on the south by the Wabash railroad and on the north by the lake, and the polling place is in Green & company's office building, corner of Sixth avenue and Connecticut street.

The Third precinct is bounded on the east by Broadway, on the west by the west line of section 4, which is one mile west of Broadway, on the south by Fifth avenue and on the north by the lake, and the polling place is at the corner of Fifth avenue and Madison street.

The Fourth precinct is all that territory in Gary lying west of the west line of section 4, and north of Tolleston, and the polling place is at Clark Station.

The Fifth precinct is bounded on the east by Broadway, on the west by the west line of section 4, which is one mile west of Broadway; on the north by Fifth avenue and on the south by the Wabash railroad, and the polling place is in the Brennan hotel building, corner of Sixth avenue and Washington street.

The Sixth precinct is bounded on the east by Broadway, on the west by Main street in Tolleston, on the north by the Wabash railroad and on the south by Nineteenth avenue, and the polling place is in Muller's real estate office, on the west side of Broadway, between Thirteenth and Fourteenth avenues.

The Seventh precinct is all that territory lying east of Broadway and south of the Wabash railroad and extending south to the Little Calumet river; also all that territory lying west of Broadway and south of Nineteenth avenue and extending west to Main street in Tolleston and south to the Little Calumet river, and the polling place is in the Gordon building, corner of Twenty-first avenue and Broadway.
