HEARD ON THE BOURSE.

J. F. Jackson—The wheat market still remains strong, owing to the good support given to it, while on the other hand the general routine news is of a weakening character.

Bartlett—We believe that Europe will be obliged to buy large quantities of our wheat for some time to come, which we think will result in still higher prices.

Logan—The wheat market is likely to gather fresh force after each dip and this of itself is sufficient suggestion for buyers.

Chicago—The wheat market opened tame and fairly steady. Large purchases by Love at the outset absorbed the rush of miscellaneous selling and prevented a decline. Trade on a pit basis new and slower.

Corn started rather slow with Bartlett-Patten buying December and selling May, and the general trade limited.
