DINING ROOM FURNITURE.

In some of the latest designs of dining room furniture English oak is a good second to mahogany. The finish of this wood is if anything darker than ever, and none but an expert would dream that it was a near relation to ordinary or golden oak, which just now gets the cold shoulder.

In sideboards, which by the way are lower than ever, and in tables, which are square preferably, and in chairs, the most popular designs of which has a medium high rather than a very tall back and almost square seats, the finish is distinctly plain, although the angularity of the mission design has given place to curves and rounded edges.

NEW CENTER TABLES.

The variety of drawing room tables seen in one place indicates that the center table of ordinary make has had its day. The newcomers have straight spindle legs and are octagonal and oblong. Some of the most fetching have hinged and six or eight inch wide drop leaves at either side. Others have gate legs, which means that the table may be folded up, enlarged or reduced in size and made to answer for more than one purpose. A variety built with a shallow drawer and also with a deep pocket at either end under folding lid may be used for afternoon tea, brie-a-brac or books.

WHEN IN DOUBT, USE BUTTONS.

It looks as though the shops would have demand for the millions of buttons they offer this season. The rule of trimming is, when in doubt, use buttons.
