

A DAY IN GARY LAND

IN THE SUPERIOR COURT

This is Gary day in the Lake superior court. Chief of Police Martin and Sergeant Cathey were over to prosecute three cases which were to come up. The case of the state vs. Will Hart, a negro, who is charged with highway robbery.

The negro is accused of picking the pockets of John Krutkowski of Gary. Krutkowski is an old man and it is presumed that Hart thought he had some of John D.'s money about his person.

The case was continued until tomorrow morning.

Another case in which Chief Martin appears as the prosecuting witness, is that of the state vs. Lawrence Ryan. Ryan is charged with stealing a pair of rubber boots from the Otis Engine company. He was arrested by the Gary police, and his case will be tried before Judge Virgil S. Reiter this afternoon if the bailiff succeeds in getting a jury.

The third case in which the Gary chief is interested is that of Antonio Lipke, who is charged with stealing some meat from a Gary market. The case is one of petit larceny and Sergeant Cathey is one of the prosecuting witnesses.

These cases will probably take up all of the afternoon, and the court will continue the work of cleaning up the criminal docket for the rest of the week.

SENATORSHIP

IS THE PRIZE

Many Legislative Seats are Likely to Be Contested Shortly.

TACTICS OF BOTH PARTIES

Democrats Watching For Coup on the Part of Republicans Who Are Contesting Election.

The fact that a United States senator is to be chosen at the next session of the legislature will lead to a number of contests for election in both houses, it is believed. Already several contests for election have been filed in different parts of the state by defeated democratic candidates for the house, and at least some of these have been filed under the direction of the democratic state organization, which, it is said, wishes to protect itself from any political schemes in the senate.

In the senate the republicans will have the majority, and therefore will have the advantage in seating members of that body. One of the possibilities that has been considered by the democrats is that the republicans, taking advantage of their majority, will temporarily seat enough republican members in the senate to cut a big figure in electing a United States senate—possibly enough to throw the United States senatorship to the republicans. Color is given to this theory by the fact that the election of the three democratic candidates for state senator in Marion county has been contested.

To Offset Senate Gains. To meet any such emergency as the wholesale unseating of democrats in the senate, the democratic state organization, it is understood, is getting ready to look after its interests in the house. In the house the democrats are in the majority, and, of course, the advantage the democrats would have in seating their members in that branch would equal those of the republicans in the upper branch. If then, the republicans should attempt to seat their members to affect the senatorship election, the democrats would attempt to seat temporarily enough of their members in the house to offset the action of the republican senate.

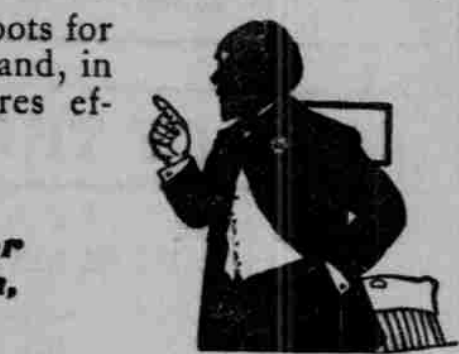

MADE WITH ENGLISH CO.

United States Steel Corporation in New Deal with English Syndicate and Brings Foreigners to Its Feet Yesterday.

BLOW STRUCK AT GERMAN INTERESTS

The United States Steel corporation has made a compact with the English steel syndicate and the news came to Gary this morning.

This was the highly vital information cabled from England late yesterday afternoon—some time after the markets had closed. The cablegram accounts for at least part of the strength of steel securities, marked by the common issue, in the face of heavy and incessant liquidation, selling which was never more persistent and voluminous than yesterday, by pools and heavily-loaded speculative individuals.

Now Reaches Understanding. The movement means a complete understanding between the American company and the association of steel and iron interests in Great Britain; and the understanding implies a general trade agreement with a mutual schedule of prices. Whether or not the pact signifies a more material unification it is too early to know or judge. One fact is clear, the skill of the steel corporation management and the superior workmanship of the company's force have brought the British combine to its knees. Of late the American concern has been selling a fair amount of its output—especially rails—in England in competition with the English combination. Evidently the sales have worried the British manufacturers.

Blow at German Interests. The covenant also strikes at Germany. German iron men, too, have caused more or less anxiety to London, Birmingham, Sheffield and Crew. Details may be expected shortly, but it can now be concluded that the scheme will prove highly beneficial to the American company, which has been the aggressor, and which naturally will dictate the terms. For one thing Canadians will no longer be supplied with rails and other material at quotations disadvantageous to the American side. It has been the bitter complaint of railway managers here that their Canadian rivals could build much cheaper because of the discrimination against them—the Americans. That will now cease and Canada will pay the general price—which will benefit the United States Steel corporation treasury.

Inner Circles Confident. Unquestionably the inner circles were confident of the result of the negotiations just completed, else there had been an outpour of steel securities from that quarter on the current advance. This, together with the enormous outside buying explains why steel common instead of slumping has actually advanced in the teeth of expert selling.

FORGERY SURPRISES GARY FOLK.

as to just what will be done with the property he owns in Gary, and the business men are wondering if it will be sold to satisfy claims which his creditors have against him as a result of his questionable methods.

The confession of the real estate man revealed a scheme of systematic and cunning forgery of notes and real estate trust deeds and mortgages extending over a period of eighteen years. The genuine paper and securities he counterfeited so artfully as to defy detection, and both the genuine and the spurious he sold in widely scattered parts of this country and in Europe. The forgeries were tracings made with the aid of an electrical tracing device.

Unable to Meet Demands. For nearly two decades he managed to liquidate the fraudulent paper which he sold and in that way avoided exposure, but recently he became unable to meet the demands of this endless chain, and, despairing of further immunity, confessed his guilt to two friends he had swindled. It is estimated that the spurious paper outstanding at this time are scattered among about twenty-five holders and amount to about \$100,000.

All records for dispoach in the state's attorneys office were broken in the indictment and trial of Van Vliessen. Within an hour and a half after the charge was laid before the grand jury the real estate man had been sentenced to prison. Last Saturday he confessed his guilt for the first time to two fellow real estate men—Thos. J. Lefens and William C. Selpp—to whom he had sold forged mortgages. At their instance Acting State's Attorney James J. Barbour called Van Vliessen to his office yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock and asked him to explain the charges.

Feminine Fads and Fancies

WASH FOR HAIR.

To clean the hair in the winter make a mixture of one cup of unsoftened corn meal, one-half cup of shaved magnesia and one tablespoonful of salt. Stir until thoroughly blended and heat in a tin pan. When warm rub thoroughly through the hair and over the scalp.

With a hair brush begin brushing out the mixture. When the hair is almost free from the preparation make a second application. Brush this out, then go into the yard and toss the hair with the hands to free it from every particle of dust. The fine comb should be used to collect the dandruff and dust from the scalp. A very oily head of hair can be beautifully cleaned in this manner. In washing a child's head, the work can be done in half the time if a few drops of kerosene are added to the suds. The oil does not injure the scalp and is beneficial to the hair.

CHOP SUEY.

Clean a chicken and scrape all the meat from the bones, then cut the flesh into pieces about an inch long. Put a little fat into a frying pan and cook the chicken in this until done, but not too brown. Add a large onion, sliced, and cook for ten minutes. Then throw a handful of dried mushrooms that have been soaked for ten minutes in water and from which the stems have been removed. Pour in enough Chinese sauce to make the contents of the pan brown, pour in a little water and stew slowly for fifteen minutes before adding a stalk of celery, cut into cut into bits six Chinese potatoes, washed and sliced. Simmer until done, thicken with browned flour and serve with boiled rice.

Superbly embroidered motifs in satin, velvet or net, for the filling in of part or lowcut corages are supplied by the designers, no corresponding trimmings necessarily appearing elsewhere on the frock, and director's waistcoats also are in evidence in all degrees of elegance usually in embroidered satin, cloth or velvet.

FEATHER TRICK.

The quills of plumage do not show this season, because of the fondness for marabou, the plumes now start off from a little bed of it. The marabou is made into a fluffy rosette and is laid all over the quill part of the feather. It is a good trick and one that should be followed.
