ST. PAUL'S MISSION DRAWING TO A CLOSE

Large Attendance Greeted
Father Howard in His
Services.

On Saturday evening and at both the services of morning and evening prayer on Sunday large congregations gathered at St. Paul's Episcopal church and listened eagerly to the inspiring sermons of Rev. Father Howard of Plymouth, Ind., in the course of mission services at that church, which have been holding the attention of the thoughtful religious people of the community for the past ten days. The subject of the sermon Saturday evening was taken from the text selected from the Acts of the Apostles, eighth chapter, seventeenth verse, and was entitled "Confirmation in Christian Life." "In the laying on of hands in confirmation," said Father Howard, "the power of the holy spirit bestows upon us the seven-fold gifts of grace which enables us to go on step by step in the Christian life and to do those things which God wants us and commanded us to do. These seven-fold gifts are understanding, wisdom, knowledge, counsel, spiritual strength, true Godliness and holy fear. Earnest cultivation of these precious gifts brings us nearer and nearer to the perfection of Christ-like character."

The following questions were answered from the standpoint of church teachings:

"What is the cause and cure of unhappy marriages?"

"How should I conduct myself in church?"

"Am I good enough to belong to the church?"

On Sunday morning at 8 o'clock there was a celebration of the holy communion, Father Howard being celebrant.

At the service at 10:45 the text of the missioner was selected from St. Luke, twenty-second chapter, nineteenth verse. The subject being: "Holy Communion with God."

The service of the sacrament of Christ's body and blood instituted by Jesus Christ himself, said the speaker, "should be the service which all Christians must faithfully observe in order to receive the full benefits of God's love and mercy toward us. Our souls will be strengthened and uplifted if we will but receive in faith the consecrated bread and wine at God's holy altar."

The following questions were answered:

"What do you think of dancing and card playing?"

"Why should I go to church?"

"If Christianity is the gospel of peace, how do you account for the fact that the so-called Christian nations are the most war-like?"

Large Attendance in the Evening.

At the evening service the largest congregation of the mission listened to the splendid sermon on the subject of "The Holy Ghost" from the text Romans, eighth chapter, fourteen verse. "The Holy Ghost, the comforter," said Father Howard, "is the one who will help you and guide you into all truth. 'Grieve not the holy spirit' was not spoken of an 'influence' but of a person. You cannot grieve an enemy; you may anger him, but you can grieve a friend. The holy spirit is our greatest friend and if we only let him come into our hearts and dwell therein we shall be blessed continually in our daily lives."

Answers were given also to the following questions:

"Why do you have an altar?"

"What do you think of Christian Science?"

"Do not Christian Science, so-called, deny the divinity of Christ, thereby becoming heresy?"

"Can a communicant of the church, believing in Christian Science, rightfully receive the sacrament of the holy eucharist?"

Discusses Christian Science.

"Christian Science," said the speaker, "is a reaction from the materialism of our age and as such is serving God's purpose in arousing Christians to their neglect of truly spiritual things. As a matter of doctrine it is heresy, as it denies the deity of our Lord and is absurd in its denial of material things. It is neither Christian nor scientific, and in many cases falls utterly because of its lack of the real essentials of Christ's teachings and will eventually disintegrate after having served the purpose for which God intended it."

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
