LECTURES ON CHARITY.

A large and representative gathering of Hammond people listened to a very able and eloquent address by Dr. I. Klein of Chicago, on the subject of "Charity" last evening in Weis hall. Dr. Klein came to Hammond under the auspices of the Jewish Ladies' Aid society, a recent organization that has already done much to alleviate the poverty and suffering in our city. The lecture was one of the best ever heard in Hammond on that subject and should have been even more largely attended. The Jewish Ladies' society was organized purely for missionary and charity work and the members were very fortunate in securing Dr. Klein to lecture here on that subject. The proceeds of the event will be used for the poor in this city.

Dr. Klein is engaged in missionary work in Chicago, coming to Chicago from Montana where he was actively engaged in the training, and this work for seventeen years. In his address he brought the facts home to the people of his audience by many illustrations. He said that charity was not merely a case of dollars and cents, but it was the spirit of sympathy and kindness which comes from the heart. Dr. Klein cited an instance in his own career where simply the interest and suggestion of a friend changed the entire course of his life and meant more than the giving of dollar and cents. It meant help to the world at large in the work of Dr. Klein today.

Mrs. I. Modjeska, president of the society, introduced the speaker and presided very ably during the remainder of the evening. A short musical program was rendered which included a very pretty piano solo by Miss Mae Arkin. Miss Josephine Vellon of Chicago, sang two very pretty soprano songs.
