FINAL WORK FOR KELLY

Chicago Middle-Weight Fight for 25-Round Bout With Papke Tomorrow.

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 14.—Working at terrific speed before an immense audience which taxed the capacity of the South Side gymnasium, Hugo Kelly wound up his training Saturday for the twenty-five-round battle tomorrow night with Billy Papke at Jeffries' Verona arena.

When the Chicago Italian bouncer on the scales after ten rounds of cyclonic milking the beam stood still at 156 pounds or two pounds under the required notch at which the middle-weights will clash.

Kelly will indulge in a few hikes along the beach roads today just by way of keeping on edge and expects to scale for the battle around 157 pounds, a figure at which he has always been able to show tremendous staying powers over long distances.

In his boxing yesterday Kelly gained his sparring partners about the gymnasium, hitting freely with both hands with sufficient force to stop an ordinary opponent. Big mits which encased the Chicagoan's hands along saved his human punching bags from knockouts.

"The Thunderbolt" is in for another trimming from the matter in which coast fans have rushed to the front with Kelly coin. Wise men who have studied the Italian's style figure his cleverness and unquestioning ring generalship will more than offset the rushing tactics which have helped the ex-champion in all his previous conquests.

Kelly, in his quiet, unassuming manner, is the personification of confidence and banks on a victory via the knockout route. He says his right arm, which was fractured in his last battle with Papke, is as strong as ever and will hold out if the fight goes the limit.

Boxing fans who visited Papke's camp found the Kewanee slugger in good shape for the go. Road work in the forenoon, followed by a lively series of boxing stunts in the afternoon, kept Papke going at a lively rate, and when he closed his activities the scales showed him to be well under the 158-pound mark.

GIANT FOOTBALL STAR DREADS TRIP TO MINES.

Aaron Bloom of Englewood Team Wants Bigger Sleeping Berth.

Fearful lest their giant center, Aaron Bloom, may not be fit for battle after a tiresome journey across the country in a sleeping berth far too small to accommodate his 6 feet 5 inches, members of the champion Englewood high school team yesterday started a still hunt to develop a new substitute for the pilot job. With all the little details of the junket perfected, it was discovered that the six-foot slumber apartment on the tourist car would compel Bloom to double up in jackknife fashion during the night season of the westward excursion.

According to the schedule mapped out for the trip the team will be on the road two days and two nights to Butte, Bloom, who answers to the cognomen "Legs," is greatly exercised over his welfare and has appealed to Manager Kenneth Calhoun to secure better accommodations. Another twelve inches would answer the purpose, according to Bloom's way of doing the problem, but he is strongly opposed to pounding his ear all the way to the mines with both pedal extremities dangling outside the berth. DECIDE ON ICE SKATING DATES.

Cleveland and Pittsburgh Will Get Big Indoor Championships.

New York, Dec. 14.—Cleveland was selected as the place for the holding of the national skating championship and Pittsburgh for the international indoor competition by the International Skating Union of the United States and Canada, which met at the Murray Hill hotel here yesterday. The union also fixed the dates and places for the season's other competitions. The schedule of sanctioned amateur speed and figure championships adopted is as follows:

National indoor championship at Cleveland, O., Jan. 25-30.

International outdoor championships at Saranac Lake, N. Y., Feb. 1-6.

It was announced that the biennial carnival of winter sports at Saranac lake will be held Feb. 2-5. For the first time since 1877 the City of Montreal, it was announced, will hold a carnival of winter sports from Feb. 10 to 20 inclusive. Snowshoeing, ski-ing, skating and kindred sports will be features of the ten-day event.

The Eastern, Western and Canadian Amateur Skating associations were represented at yesterday's meeting respectively by D. H. Slabeck of Verona, N. J., and by John Harding of Saranac Lake; by Allen I. Blanchard of Chicago; by Louis Rubenstein of Montreal.
