Probably one of the most interesting of these new works is that "The World I Live In," by Helen Keller, the deaf, dumb and blind girl. Some of the works are of a practical nature, as, for instance, those on celery, tomato and bean culture and a book entitled "Practical Dairy Bacteriology."
