POPULATION LIKE TO READ

Approximately twelve out of every 100 persons of Hammond's population visited the public library during the month of August, according to the monthly report of the librarian, Mrs. Jennie Sawyer. The exact figures were 2,118. Of this number 1,480 were adults and 1,688 children.

The number of people who visited the reading rooms totals \$75. One thousand nine hundred and ninety-nine volumes, or one book less than 2,000, were taken out by the reading public.

In order to secure better accommodation to the patrons who order their books by catalogue, Mrs. Sawyer has relabeled all the books on the shelves.

A number of new books have been added to the library, three of these having been donated by Mrs. J. F. Kelly. The following books constitute Mrs. Kelly's gift to the library:

"Strong Mac," by Crockett; "Prodigal Son," by Calne, and "Later Adventures of Wee McGregor," by Bell.
