Furnace Being Repaired.
Furnace number 7 is out of commission for a few weeks as the result of an accident some time ago. Its lining was burned out and workmen are busy putting it into shape for use.

READY TO BE BLOWN

New Furnace Will Make Eight That Will Then Be in Operation.

Plant furnace number 8 at the steel plant is completed and is now ready to be "blown in." When it is producing iron the eighth blast furnace will be in operation at the Gary plant.

The new furnace may be put in commission any day. Just as soon as word comes from the general offices of the steel corporation in New York Suppl. Gleason will have the torch applied and Gary will be producing 450 more tons of iron daily.

During the month of May the six furnace stacks in operation at the local plant brose the steel corporations record for producing pig iron. An average of 450 tons was made daily.
