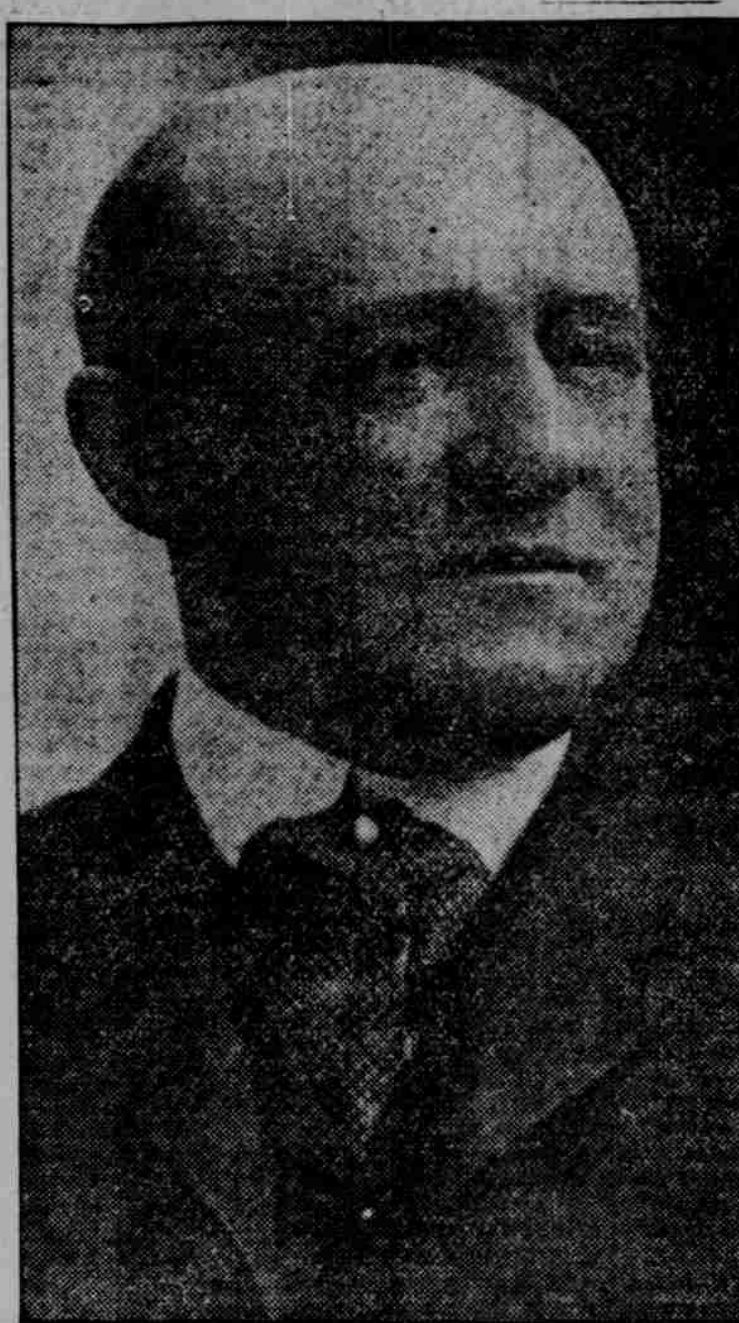

## HINTS ON CITY BEAUTIFUL.

There is a moral as well as a physical aspect to the question of the city beautiful. It is useless to have a city with streets and houses beautifully kept if the action of a portion of its residents make it an unpleasant place for the others to live in.

Hammond is better, in many respects, to live in than many other cities, but it shares some of their disadvantages. Among these is the habit among its men, and usually the least desirable of them of congregating upon the street corners and criticizing and making audible remarks about the women who pass them.

A woman, who is at all sensitive to things of this kind, endures torture in walking along the streets when she knows that these conditions exist. It is to be regretted that they do exist to some extent in Hammond. Every right-thinking man owes it to the city to take steps to remedy this condition whenever and wherever he encounters it. Whether the woman thus insulted is a member of his own family or circle of friends or not, if every man in the city would cause the arrest of any loafer whom he caught in the act of insulting or bothering any woman, whether known by him or not, the practice would be wiped out in a day.

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## Days News In Gary

### Verplank To Build.

J. J. Verplank has drawn the plans for a residence for himself and will commence to build probably some time during the present week or next. The house will be at the corner of Seventh avenue and Tyler street and will occupy two lots. Mr. Verplank intends to have a fine residence and would have builded long ago had he had time to do so. He has, however, been so busy arranging for the homes of other people that he has not, up to the present, had time for his own.

### Capital Stock Increased.

The Gary Trust and Savings Bank corner of Seventh avenue and Broadway, controlled chiefly by Mayor T. E. Knotts of Gary and his brother, A. F. Knotts of Hammond, has been granted

permission to increase its capital stock from \$25,000 to \$50,000. Since it first started business a little less than a year ago the bank has had a wonderful growth as can be seen by its statement published the first of July. The increasing of the capital stock has been considered for some time past by the directors.

### Lake Among the Leaders.

With the exception of two counties, more money is spent in Lake county than in any other similar political division of the state. Lake is exceeded only by Marion which has Indianapolis within its limits and Vigo which has Terre Haute for its county seat. Marion county will have an appropriation of the school fund of \$122,392.89; while Vigo will receive \$49,216.32 and Lake the sum of \$41,037.75. Porter and Newton counties are adjoining neighbors and get \$12,395.16 and \$6,139.65 respectively.
