ROOSEVELT PLATFORM TALK ONLY FOR OHIO

Colonel Explains He Did Not Mean "Progressive" for All States of Nation.

Oyster Bay, N. Y., July 22.—Colonel Roosevelt announced Wednesday that he had been misunderstood Tuesday when he was quoted as favoring the adoption by republicans conventions generally this fall for progressive platforms. He had meant to limit his expressed desire, he explained Wednesday, to Ohio.

"What I intended to say," Roosevelt declared at his home here Wednesday, was: "I cannot support any candidate for any nomination. I am of the hope that a progressive platform in other states have a different significance."

The colonel had no visitors Wednesday morning and spent most of his time in catching up with his correspondence and in dictating certain data to his secretary.

LABOR NEWS

A new state law of Rhode Island prevents children from working evenings. The Glass Blowers' Association of the United States and Canada held its annual convention in Atlantic City, N. J., last week.

The eleventh annual convention of the California State Federation of

Labor will meet in Los Angeles the week beginning October 3.

Organized labor contemplates recommending a nine-hour day and a fifty-hour week for women at the next session of the Washington legislature.

The constitutionality of the law requiring railroad corporations to pay their employees semi-monthly has been upheld by the New York state court of appeals.

Final settlement was arranged between the striking cigar makers and the manufacturers of London, Ont., and all men returned at once. A satisfactory compromise was arranged.

Fifty unions have affiliated with the California State Federation of Labor during the last seven months. At the next convention of the federation practically every union in the state will be represented.

The German government pays damages to those injured on the state owned and operated railroads. Last year these satisfactions amounted to more than \$1,400,000, or four per cent on an investment of \$35,000,000.

The general assembly of Louisiana has just given a decisive victory to the child labor law by refusing to entertain an amendment having for its object the exemption of all theaters and nickel shows.

The French government has decided that it will be impossible to apply the workmen's old age pension law, which will cost the treasury more than \$25,000,000 annually, until the last quarter of the year 1911.


