ness. Not a light glimmered from any window and not a sound penetrated to the outside.

WRIT OF REPLEVIN.

In the meantime the committee had long since got what it had come after, having secured a writ of replevin for the property at the court of Judge William A. Reiland. The committee was composed of John Tenkely, the president of the benevolent society, his brother Andrew Tenkely, Joseph Horwat, Steve Cipela and Joseph Vendell. A constable was dispatched to the scene of the trouble, and on being served with the paper from the court, Father Bogner gave up the money and emblems. One flag the writ did not call for, and this Father Bogner placed outside on a fence, when the constable failed to take it. The mob had dispersed, but later some of the men returned and the sight of the flag aroused them to frenzy.

Somebody started the cry that the emblem had been dishonored. That the priest had thrown it out. This report spread like wild fire and in a short time the crowd of a score or more had grown to a mob of hundreds ho threatened and gesticulated, shouting out their defiance to the priest and daring him to come outside and be killed upon the spot.

HOW TROUBLE STARTED.

The trouble is the culmination of disaffection among the parishioners, which had its origin at the time Father Bogner was first installed in this parish. In place of Father Sillagyl. While Father Bogner is liked by the better element in his church, there is a faction, composed to a considerable extent according to report of the more ignorant of his parishioners, who desire Father Sillagyl reinstated. It is said that Father Sillagyl who is now in town made a call at the parochial residence yesterday and was denied admittance.

The merits of the case will be thrashed out before Judge W. A. Reiland the first of the week. Attorney P. McCloskey has been retained by the society to represent it in the proceedings which will be instituted for the permanent possession of the emblems.
