costs to build a good road, during the life of that road.

At the present time the project to improve Sheffield avenue is held up by litigation. The Hammond, Whiting & East Chicago railroad refused to pay the cost of paving the space between its tracks. It enjoined the board of county commissioners from enforcing an assessment and the case has never been forced to trial.

If the matter is delayed very much longer the improvement of Sheffield avenue will be delayed until next year and that will mean another year of delay.

The Heintz plant large.

Very few people realize the magnitude of the automobile business in Hammond. The Heintz establishment in itself is worthy of a city twice the size of Hammond.

Ten men are employed in this plant. A four-story building, costing \$40,000, is devoted exclusively to the automobile business. Twenty-five thousand dollars in stock is carried all of the time and no Chicago garage is better equipped to provide the automobile with anything he needs in any size. In connection with this business Heintz has begun the manufacture of automobile tires.

The Heintz plant is an important industry for Hammond. It is but one of several important industries of the same character. It is this business that will be encouraged and conserved by the building of adequate roads between Hammond and Chicago.
