Plans for Funerals of Gary Firemen Killed En Route to Alarm.

Lake county cities today extended official honors to Capt. Charles Smith and Fireman Otto Doege of the Gary fire department, who were killed Wednesday evening when a Michigan Central flyer struck their motor car at the Roosevelt street grade crossing.

The funeral of Capt. Charles Smith was held this afternoon. Proceeding

from the Williams and Marshall undertaking parlors in Washington street the procession went to Broadway and south in that street. A horse car from No. 3 Station, where Smith was in command, bore the coffin.

In the procession was a squad of police, firemen from Gary and other cities, city employees and others. At the Pennsylvania tracks making ends and the party proceeded by auto to Crown Point.

On the outskirts of Crown Point the funeral party was met by members of the volunteer department there. Capt. Smith formerly belonged to the Hub department.
