

MILITARY MEETINGS AT GARY

Two meetings of a military nature have been held at Jefferson school auditorium, Gary, last evening. High school boys were told of the benefits of the Wyoming military instruction plan, which has been adopted in Chicago and many Indiana cities. Engineers and mechanics heard army officers discuss the possibilities of employment in the engineer reserve of the army.

Schools May Go In For Training. Physical Director Jack O'Leary, Capt. J. A. Campbell of the national guard, Capt. Ord and Lieut. Conrad of the regular army, spoke to the boys on the high school training corps. It was arranged that meetings be held at Froebel and Emerson schools early next week.

Engineers Enthusiastic. The school boys assembled in the auditorium, the engineer meeting arranged by Capt. A. P. Mellon, engineer officers reserve corps, was attended by sixty men. The speakers at the last meeting also addressed the engineer cadets. Those who sign up will be subject to call only in case of war.

Another meeting will be held next week, the date to be announced later. Engineers and mechanics of all kinds are desired by the service.

Militia May Move Soon. Capt. Campbell, Lieut. Riley and First Sergeant Malone are busy recruiting Company F to war strength. The temporary headquarters is over Woolworth's five and ten cent store.

It is expected the Gary company will enter service within a week.

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NEW RAIDER IN PACIFIC

RIO DE JANEIRO, March 31.—Two hundred and sixty-five men and 2 women, survivors of eleven steamers, and sailing vessels, sunk in the Atlantic, brought into port another amazing German raider story. They arrived on a French bark. They said the new German raider was called the "Sea Adder."

She is a sailing vessel with auxiliary gasoline engines armed with two cannons and two rapid firing guns, and flies the Norwegian flag. Her commander is Count Luckner. She left Germany, Dec. 22nd, escorted by submarines and sailed northward to Iceland after which she worked southward. Most of her victims were sunk around Trinidad.

The survivors said they had been drowned. The raider's victims as listed by the survivors were: five British steamers and sailing vessels, one Canadian schooner, three French steamers, one French sailing vessel, and one Italian steamer. The tonnage ranged from 2,500 tons to 400 tons and the sinkings occurred principally during the month of January and February.

On March 14th, the survivors said, the sailing vessel Rongarth found the raider, her shells killing one member of the crew and wounding four. Later on the Rongarth which flew the British flag was sunk by the raider.

CENSORSHIP OVER INDIANA MILITIA

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and points for guard duty, protection of bridges, factories and other valuable property be suppressed and that all newspapers in such cities as guard detachments may be sent to refrain from the publication of such news or its dissemination.

General Smith prepared a formal statement of the points he desired the "patriotic censorship" to cover, and said he would give it to Indianapolis newspapers, in the hope that each of them would be patriotic enough to abide by it, regardless of whatever action might be taken by other newspapers.

INLAND EMPLOYEE DEAD OF INJURIES

Conscious almost to the last, Alvo Hollis Montgomery, 28 years old, an employee of the Indiana Harbor plant of the Inland Steel company, died yesterday at Mercy hospital, Gary, of injuries received while at work. Montgomery was crushed Thursday evening. His young wife, of Windsor Park, South Chicago, was with her husband when he died. She took his death very hard.

Underwriter P. C. Emery today shipped the remains to Evansville, via Chicago. The young widow and relatives of Mr. Montgomery went to Evansville today, where the funeral is to be held.

MILITIA READY FOR ORDERS

Harry B. Smith, adjutant-general, awaited orders relative to the movement of additional units of the Indiana national guard, other than those of the Second Infantry already ordered into federal service. One of the developments was the receipt by General Smith of a telegram setting out that soldiers who had not or would not take the dual oath required under the Hay-Chambliss act of last summer should be dropped from the muster.

Guard officials have expected orders from Washington throughout the week for the quick mobilization of further units of the guard, or their dispatching from home stations to inland police duty, for these have not been received. Meanwhile the guard is recruiting throughout the state in going forward under a tremendous burst of speed, and new organizations of guardsmen are being offered to General Smith from many of the counties and cities.
