

300 OFFICERS CHARGE 6000 SOCIALISTS

Rioting Occurs in Toledo Yesterday at Bolshevik Meeting; 80 Arrested.

WASHINGTON, March 31.—Eugene V. Debs must serve his ten year sentence for violation of the espionage act.
The supreme court of the United States denied the petition of his attorney for a rehearing of his case. The opinion was handed down, the bare announcement that the court had dismissed the petition being made.

TOLEDO, O., March 31.—Following rioting in Memorial Hall yesterday by 6,000 Socialists when police called off a meeting which was to have been addressed by Eugene V. Debs, Mayor Cornell Schrieber today announced that no meeting will be permitted to be held in this city where it is suspected a man of radical tendencies is to speak.

A substitute speaker had been secured when the police served notice that the Socialists would not be permitted to use Memorial Hall. Eighty men, including Thomas Dewine, Socialist member of the city council, were arrested in the rioting Sunday.

DEBS DID NOT SPEAK.
Debs, because of illness, had cancelled his engagement to address the meeting.
Several persons suffered minor injuries when 300 policemen dispersed the crowd, keeping them on charges of inciting to riot. Later all the prisoners were released without bail.

PLAN POLITICAL REVOLUTION

CLEVELAND, O., March 31.—Our whole plan is political revolution; no more reforms in the present social or political systems. "We are committed uncompromisingly to industrial and political mass action."

The vote eliminated from a voice in the Cleveland party for the right wing or conservative Socialists and committed the party heretofore to the revolutionary doctrine of Russia.

IN FINANCIAL TROUBLE; ENDS LIFE

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., March 31.—Gerald Barnes Seldomridge, 50, son of former Congressman Seldomridge of Colorado Springs, committed suicide at a local hotel here last night, in the presence of his wife, as a result of taking poison.
Coroner D. F. Law took charge of the body and announced there would be no inquest.
It is said Seldomridge had been in financial difficulties and this was taken as the cause for his action. He leaves besides his widow a three year old daughter.

THIRTEEN MINERS ENTOMBED

AGRICOLA, Colo., March 31.—Thirteen coal miners are entombed in the Empire coal mine here as the result of a gas explosion shortly before eight o'clock this morning. Relief is expected that all of those entombed are dead as nothing has been heard from them since the accident and the two helmet cases sent into the workings after the explosion have not returned or sent up any word to noon. There were 35 men in the mine when the explosion took place and of these twenty-three escaped, twenty-one coming out through the old Peerless incline shaft and two by way of the climax shaft.

EXPECT AGREEMENT WITH LENINE

LONDON, March 31.—Debs is being made in Berlin that German makes an agreement with Nicholas Lenin, the Bolshevik premier of Russia, before the peace conference does, said a press dispatch from the German capital today.

COMPLAINT AGAINST MORRIS DISMISSED

Packers Not Guilty of Selling Unwholesome Meat to Soldiers.

WASHINGTON, March 31.—The complaint against Morris & Co., meat packers of Chicago, charged with selling unwholesome meat to the government for the use of soldiers at Camp Travis and Logan, Texas, in November and December, 1913, this afternoon was dismissed by the federal trade commission.
"As there is no pending danger or likelihood of a recurrence of the practices set forth in the complaint and proven, and the commission holds that while it has jurisdiction in the premises, it is of the opinion that an order to cease and desist would not now serve a useful purpose."
