

SETTLES STRIKE FOR A PERIOD

At a monster meeting of some 500 striking steel workers of the Gary Screw and Bolt works at Turner Hall at Fourteenth avenue and Broadway last night, an agreement was reached between representatives of the company and the strikers.

After a complete shut-down since

last Monday morning when a general walkout occurred, the plant resumed operation this morning and practically all employees are back at work. The strike effected in the neighborhood of 20 percent of the employees.

The agreement reached was that all men who had been laid off be re-instated and that all employees be given the time and one-half for overtime claimed to be taken away.

While the strikers have other demands to make, they will not be presented until in the near future, when it is said in union circles that the amalgamated labor body of the iron and steel workers will go before the officials of the United States Steel Corporation of Gary to discuss the labor situation.

When the climax is expected is not definitely known. The conference is

Intense interest is now being played, not only by the steel workers but Gary as a whole. Should the Steel Corporation refuse the demands and the steel workers walk out, it is said that the steel corporation is now in a position to stand pat.

RAIN STOPS GARY FLIGHTS YESTERDAY

A heavy rain in the morning, causing a soggy field, prevented Pilots Paul Milner and G. W. Farley of the Interstate Air Line Company of Chicago from making any passenger carrying flights in Gary yesterday. The failure of the arrival of some special gasoline from Hammond was also responsible for the two bi-planes not leaving the ground.

In a fifteen minute interview with Mr. Milner and Farley, a Times reporter found the two air pilots, very pleasing and interesting to talk to. Both appeared to be very enthusiastic over their work and said while flying was a business matter with them, they at the same time derived a lot of pleasure out of the game.

GARY LANDING SITE.

"This is a very good landing site," said Pilot Milner, "and if the city is securing on securing a municipal landing site which they will have to no doubt in the future, I do not think Gary could find any better."

"It is just far out enough from the outskirts of the city and close to the street car line. From every direction one gets an open view of the field, from a long distance in the air and there is ample ground for a good take off and to land. All that would be needed would be to level the ground in a few places, and a heavy roller would accomplish the purpose nicely."

GARY SHOULD TAKE ACTION.

"It will only be the matter of a short time that Gary will find itself behind the time if it does not have a landing field for the air ships. In another five years the air will be common with aeroplanes and if Gary is not on the air map, why aviators will not even give it the once over."

FIVE YEARS AHEAD.

"England is five years ahead of America in her airship program. All important cities in the country have landing sites and all that a pilot has to do is to look at his map and see if his location and whether suitable or otherwise."

"This is what we are endeavoring to do in America and soon it will be possible for us to get a machine at Chicago, take a trip to Gary, Michigan City, South Bend, and other cities en route and land where we please. These numerous landing sites will also aid in the safety of the game, as a pilot never knows what's going to go wrong with his plane and if something does go wrong, the first thing he will do is to look below for a landing site."

FOR UNIVERSAL TRAINING

WASHINGTON, July 31—Universal military training for the army and navy is provided for in a bill introduced in the house today by Rep. Kahn, of California, chairman of the house military affairs committee. All male citizens and those who have declared intention of becoming citizens between the ages of 18 and 20 years, would be affected. The training would be for a period of six months, with additional time for enrollment, mobilization and demobilization.

WHITTING, Ind., Aug. 1.—The Board of Directors of the Standard Oil Co. of Indiana and the members of the Joint General Committee of the Whiting refinery met at dinner and conference in the dining hall at the plant on Thursday evening. This company recently put into effect an Industrial Relations Plan, whereby representatives elected by the employees and representatives appointed by the management, form a committee empowered to consider any matter of mutual interest to employees and management or any matter of special interest to employees.

The Board of Directors has adopted as its plan a plan for meeting with these representatives for the purpose of becoming intimately acquainted with them and thus break down the imaginary barrier often existing between employees and officials of a corporation.

A number of those present addressed the meeting and discussed themselves freely in regard to the Industrial Relations Plan recently adopted and in regard to other general policies of the company. The entire evening was expressive of a general feeling of harmony and co-operation.

For this offense he was fined \$50 and costs, and appealed the case to a higher court. There are three similar charges pending against Greenwald in the Whiting city court, these being preferred against him by Elizabeth Kabel, Joseph Lesko and John Hajduk. He is under \$500 bonds in the Kabel case, \$250 in the Lesko and \$500 in the Hajduk case. The Hajduk case is booked for August 22.

Greenwald, it will be remembered, is said to have secured money from a number of Whiting people by means of an insurance misrepresentation.
