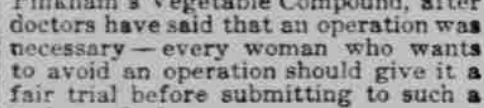

PLUMB SAYS THEY'RE PUBLIC'S

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) WASHINGTON, AUGUST 11.—That surplus earnings on profits of railroads re-invested in the properties by the management in past years, belong to the public and should not be included in any plan for compensation for such properties if taken over by the government, was the contention of Glenn E. Plumb, counsel for the Railroad Brotherhoods in presenting his plan for the nationalization of the railroads and their operation under a tripartite board, before the house interstate and foreign commerce committee today.

Plumb reiterated there could be no operation of the railroads by the railroads direct, holding that such operation "would not be democratic."

He said there was efficiency in the postoffice department management, but not democracy. He claimed there could be no democracy in industry under a political government because of the secret or hidden influence
