IDAHO SKIES BLACK WITH SMOKE FROM HUGE FOREST FIRES

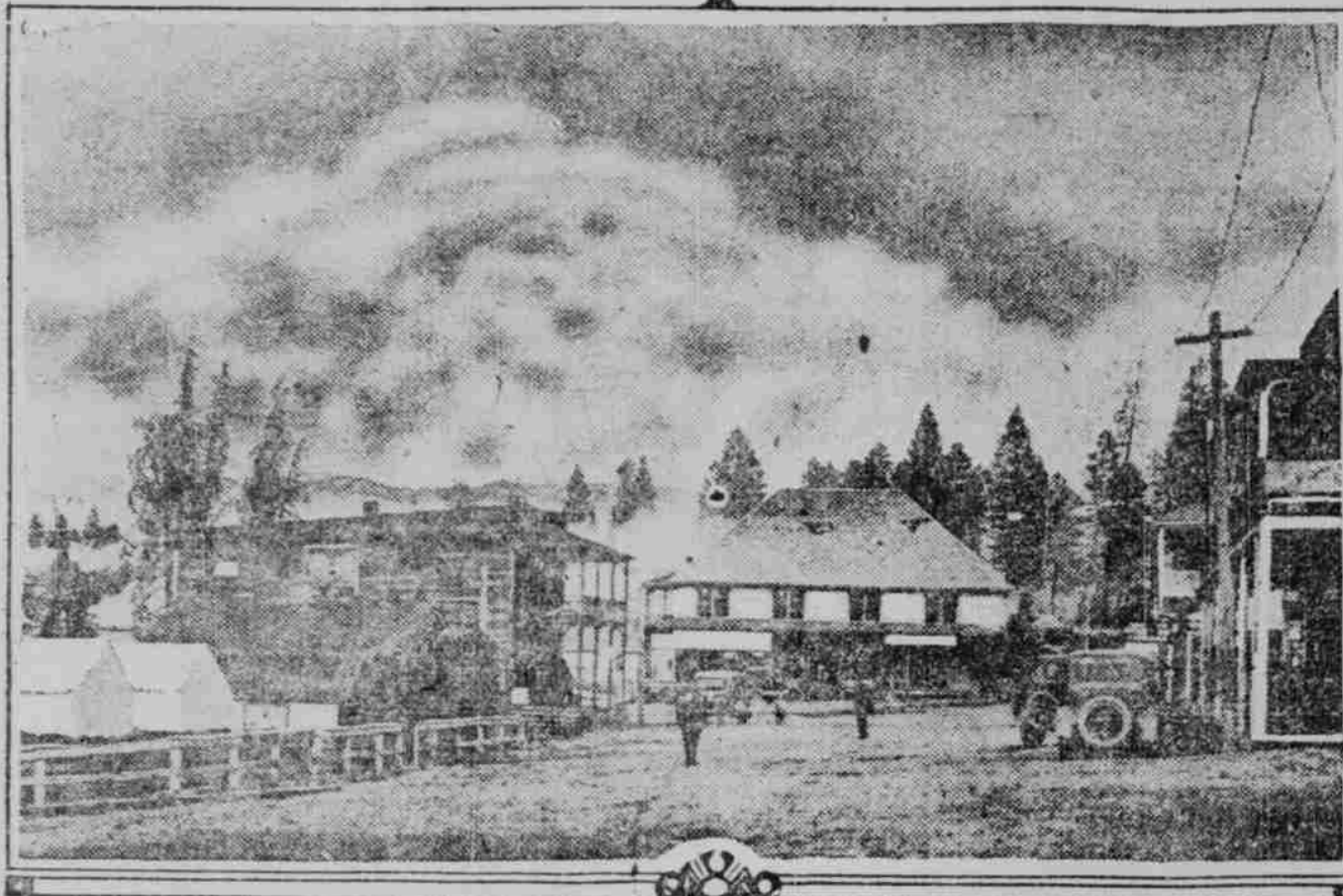


Photo taken in McCall, Idaho, shows smoke rising from forest fires fifteen miles away.
