

LATEST MOVES IN THE ADRIATIC REGION



- 1—A settlement of the Adriatic question is declared to be imminent. Fiume, Zara and Sebenico become free cities. This will be a compromise solution.
- 2—Bolshevik riots are reported to be in progress in Trieste.
- 3—According to unofficial reports, Greece and Italy are about to partition Albania. Italy will establish a firmer hold on Avlona and will assume a protectorate over the rest of the country.
- 4—Greece will probably annex northern Epirus, or, as it is now called, southern Albania. The Greeks have claimed this territory for a long time. The Adriatic sea seems to bid fair to become an Italian lake. The heavy broken line shows the boundary of Italian influence and the tinted areas the lands on the eastern shore where the Italians are established.

ROMANTIC STORY TOLD IN COURTS

PARIS, Aug. 13.—The romantic story of a wealthy young American's love for a beautiful Spanish girl, their marriage, his alleged elopement with his wife's pretty cousin, and the death of the dancer, broken-hearted and alone, was revealed here today at a conference of the representatives of the Winans and Whistler families of Baltimore, Md., and Lenox, Mass., and a swarthy, wrinkled-faced old Spaniard, the father of the unfortunate beauty. The conference marked the opening scene in an amazing international legal fight for the millions of Ross Whistler Winans, Baltimore, and New York millionaire, whose son Thomas George Winans, eleven years ago married Victoria Delgado, daughter of an old tavern keeper in the seaport town of Malaga, Spain, and famous as the most beautiful girl in the Spanish peninsula.

For his two grandchildren the old tavern keeper of Malaga is seeking to obtain a share of the fortune of their dead grandfather, estimated at between \$15,000,000 and \$20,000,000, a sum that would make them two of the wealthiest children in the world. He is striving to retain custody of the children at the same time. The Winans and Whistler families are attempting to have the children given over to the care of their father, who is now living in Switzerland. At the conference today in a dingy little courtroom of the ninth Paris district, the old Spaniard opposed such action so strenuously that the decision was finally postponed a fortnight to give the Winans and Whistlers time to offer evidence that the children's father is a suitable person to take them in charge.

The story begins in the ancient Spanish town of Malaga, twelve years ago, where old Delgado kept a little tavern. His two daughters Marie and Victoria, were locally famous as dancers and were called the most beautiful girls in all Spain, so persistent became the attentions of their many suitors that the old Spaniard used to mount guard with a gun over the stairs leading from the drinking room to the tavern to the quarters where the girls and their mother lived.

Foreign tourists attracted by stories of the charming dancers visited the tavern. The Maharajah Kapulthala, one of the most influential and wealthiest of Indian princes, fell violently in love with Marie, convinced the tavern keeper that his affection was not of a passing nature and finally married the girl. Their married life has been one of unalloyed happiness. Then young Winans, who had been touring Europe arrived in Malaga, became infatuated with Victoria and married her in 1908. A boy and a girl were born to this marriage. A few years later, according to Arthur Valabroque the attorney for the children, the American began to neglect his wife and eventually deserted her, eloping with her black-eyed cousin, Carmen Garcia, another noted beauty. At first, the attorney says, Winans allowed her \$3,000 pocket money but the payments became irregular and the dancing girl was forced to sell her jewels to save her babies from starvation.

Meanwhile Ross Winans died in Baltimore, leaving a fortune. Victoria wrote Ross Whistler, a member of the family, claiming money for the support of herself and children. Whistler's lawyer, Charles W. Field, of Baltimore, eventually agreed to pay her one thousand francs a month, according to the attorney, on condition that she dropped her suit, in which she alleged infidelity against Thomas Winans in the Spanish courts.

Last year during the influenza epidemic, Victoria died broken-hearted and alone at Biola. At about the same time the lawyer declared Winans who had gone to Switzerland was subject to the control of Ross Whistler who began paying off his debts which were said to total 2,000,000 francs. The children were placed in custody of Spanish grandparents at Malaga. Their father at once began efforts to obtain custody of them and persuaded the Delgados to bring them to Paris last April. The police commissary's office then attempted to induce the old Spaniard couple to turn the children over to their father, but the former chief of police of Malaga, a great friend of Delgado, was in Paris and intervened successfully on behalf of the tavernkeeper. The Paris courts then conferred custody of the grandchildren to the Delgados for one year. For several months the little boy and girl have been living with the family of the Maharajah Kapulthala. The Indian prince and his wife proposed a family conference on the subject of the children's rights and was held in London.

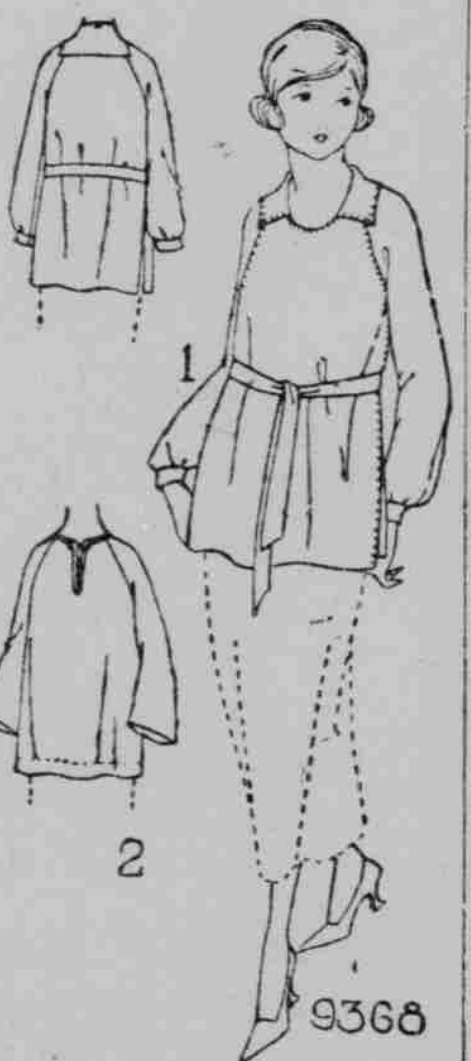

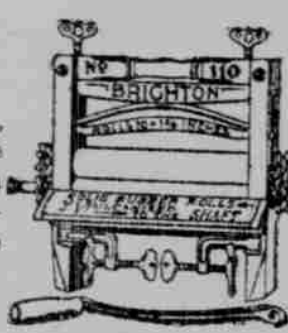
