Bob Foster signed up the Gary aggregation late yesterday afternoon, and then went over to Michigan City to see if he could hook up a game with H. and B. where he ran into Floyd Fitzsimmons, of Benton Harbor, who had quite a peeve on because Doc had copped two of his best men, Kohler and Claffey. Among the choice names he applied to the Rumley manager were "safeflower" and "train robber." He told Doc that he would see to it that LaPorte didn't get a game with Michigan City until he got his men back.

Before Foster left the Harbor City last night a verbal agreement was arrived at after much dickering, but before Doc got it down in black and white, Manager Jack Cading of the H. & B. team was called away. Sport Snap Shots

The largest rifle tournament ever attempted in any country is to be held at Caldwell, N. J., this summer. A force of 700 bluejackets and marines are working night and day to complete the new 150 target butts, which when finished will make the largest rifle range in the world. The construction of barracks and mess halls has been begun to accommodate the thousands of riflemen and visitors expected to arrive during the next six weeks.

In addition to the time honored Wimbledon and Leech cup matches several innovations have been planned. A small bore match with Enfield, the entry of Canadian, Italian, French and Belgian teams and the return of the victorious A. E. F. rifle team give the big shoot an international aspect, and by the addition of trap shooting to the list of events hundreds of clay bird enthusiasts have been lured to the firing line.

Although the navy is conducting the matches for the first time this year the army is to be represented by a huge exhibit filling fifteen specially constructed buildings. A 700 foot spur track has been laid to accommodate the 14-inch long range gun that battered the German made Krupp into submission at Chaulnes and elsewhere. The small arms school, at which the admission is free, has drawn civilian and military organizations from every state in the union.

An aviation meet has been arranged by Major General Charles T. Menoher, director of air service, who has shipped seven planes to Caldwell. Lieut. Col. William C. Harlow, U. S. M. C., has been appointed by Secretary Daniels as executive officer in recognition of his initiative and efforts to establish a chain of rifle

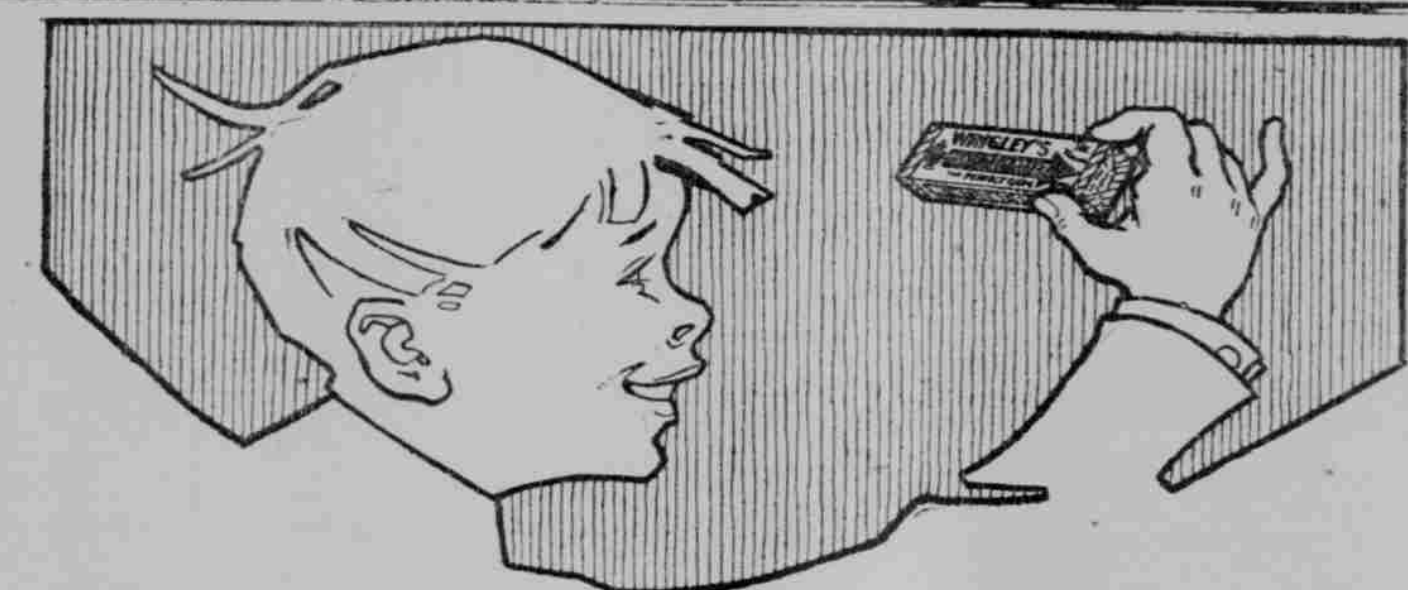
