

ORMSBY'S SHEEHANS COMING

Red Hot Game is Expected
In Hammond Tomorrow

With City Leaguers.

Hammond will take on one of the leading teams of the Chicago League tomorrow afternoon when they play the Sheehans, managed by "Red" Ormsby, just recently returned from service in France.

Since being appointed as leader of this club, Ormsby has succeeded in gathering together a bunch of semi-pro stars, including Sherwood Sunbeam, Centerfielder Forrest, Catcher Dixon and Pitchers Tom McGuire and Louis Flane. Last Sunday in a game against the Normals, with George Pierce pitching, Flane let this club down with four hits, while his mates pointed Pierce getting eleven blows, good for about fifteen bases.

Tom McGuire, at one time with the Chieftains and very recently with the White Sox, pitched a no-hit game on last Sunday for Paxton, Ill., against Peoria of the Three-I league. Only 27 batters faced McGuire in nine innings and he struck out thirteen men.

It was immediately following this game that Ormsby got in touch with McGuire and according to latest reports he has been signed to pitch tomorrow's game against the locals. If McGuire does the hurling, Flane will undoubtedly play first base as aside from being a good man at the initial sack, Lou is also a good hitter. Ormsby, who used to be considerable semipro pitcher before he entered the service, may play one of the outfield berths, as he can still hit with the best of them. When last seen, "Red" promised to bring out a regular club, to back up his star pitchers, as he is determined to turn in a win against the Hammond team.

Manager Nagel has been dickerling with a couple of new fielders, who have just returned from the Northern League and one of the men, Spratler, who is a brother to the left fielder with the Magnets, will undoubtedly seen in action in tomorrow's game. The other player is Bob Lowe, a crack shortstop who is much in demand and at the time of going to press it was not definitely known whether or not Nagel had been successful in outbidding other Chicago league managers, who are also angling for the services of this star. Miller, the new first baseman, signed last week and will play the initial sack for Hammond the rest of the season. Cronin will also be a permanent fixture on the club. Fans need not be surprised if they hear that Nagel has lined up Jack Sullivan, star left hand pitcher recently with the Gunthers and now a member of the White Sox, as he is now trying to land this phenom, so as to be able to finish the season strong, against such clubs as the Los Angeles, who are booked here for Labor Day, Juliet, the Gunthers and possibly Fairbanks Morse or the Nash Motors. The Dodger Trainings with Elmer Meamer pitching are booked here for a return game next Sunday and Gary who are insisting on another game for a \$300 side bet will probably have to be taken on a little later in the season.

Georgian Defeats Fownes,
5-3, and Pittsburgher
Downs Platt, 7-6.

OAKMONT GOLF COURSE, Pa., Aug. 25.—Devised Herren, the sturdy Pittsburgh player, and Bobby Jones, the 17 year old Atlanta boy, are the finalists in the national amateur golf championship.

Herren, as was expected, outclassed J. Wood Plaut of the North Hill club of Philadelphia in the semi-finals yesterday, winning 7 and 6, the Quaker city player passing by several others who had gone through grueling matches on the days preceding their exits. Platt came to Oakmont in the hope of qualifying and his showing exceeded his modest hopes. He gained renown by eliminating Outmet and by being the first Philadelphia to gain a position in the final quartet.

Bobby Jones went into the final bracket through the medium of a 5 and 3 victory over William C. Fownes Jr. of the Oakmont club. Bill Fownes was playing golf when Bobby Jones, who was 17 on last St. Patrick's day, was in swaddling clothes. Bill's son, Henry, who qualified, is older than the redoubtable Atlanta boy, who flashed onto the golfing firmament at Merion in 1916 when only 14 years of age.

Fownes was the last of the veterans to pass from the title race. Herren, who has just started on his career in the steel business, is 21 years old.

ELGIN, Ill., Aug. 23.—With many of the fastest speed cars in the country prepared for their best, predictions were made this morning that records would go by the boards in the seventh annual race due to start at noon. NEWARK, N. J., Aug. 22.—That

young Jack Britton is not middleweight champion of the world today as well as welterweight title-holder, because decisions are not permitted by the referee here.

In 8 rounds of tearing slashing boxing last night the 37-year-old kingpin gave Mike O'Dowd, middleweight ruler, as pretty a licking as was ever administered to a fighter under the Marquis of Queensberry rules.

O'Dowd carried off the honors in one round—the third. In every other session Britton led by such a wide margin that even the O'Dowd supporters were forced to admit it. Britton's left continually found a resting place in the middleweight's face. In addition Britton scored repeatedly with his right and several

of his punches shook his heavier opponent severely.

O'Dowd's weight was announced as

155 and Britton's as 146.
