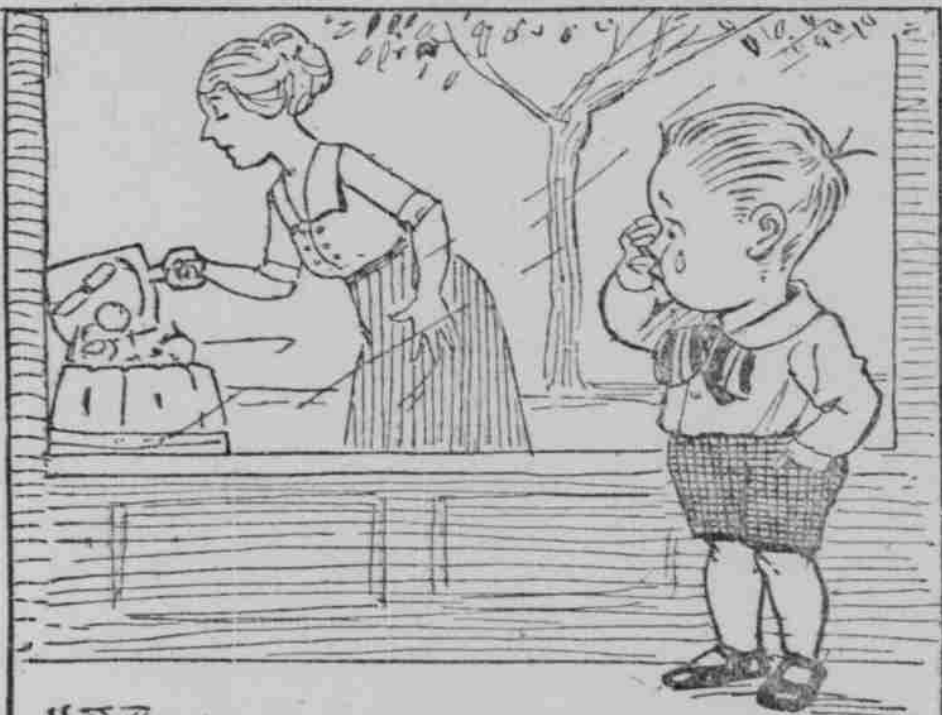

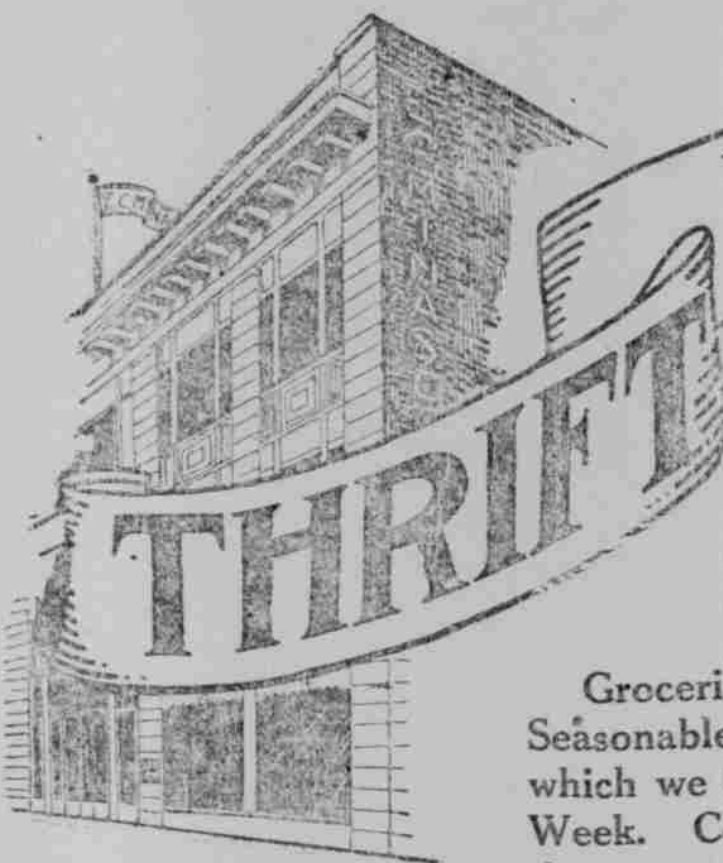

The fire department was called out Friday evening to put out a fire that had got into a bridge on Oakley avenue. The fire was endangering the property of J. A. Kimmel.

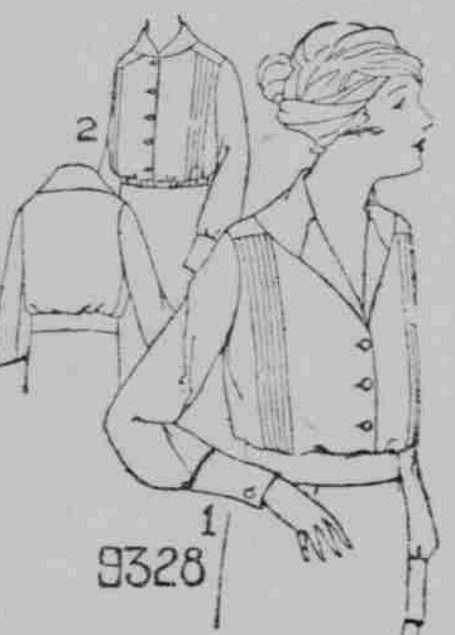
Fashion's Forecast
