Then the Greeks rushed troops to that point and the two erstwhile "allies" were fighting for possession of the town when the peace conference ordered the U. S. S. Arizona to the port. Her arrival there and the landing of marines and sailors had a quieting effect on the situation and averted more serious trouble. During the settlement of the trouble Americans took many Armenian and Greek children on board the Arizona to protect them.



L. N. Best, of Rose Lawn, was in Lowell on business Saturday.


Ben Laybourne returned yesterday from a visit with his son and family in Illinois.


