"A speaker must be clearer than a writer, since a speaker's meaning must be caught at once if at all," says a well-known author.

This fact applies particularly to telephone conversations, largely because the listener cannot see the speaker and catch part of the idea from his facial expression, as is the case in a face-to-face talk. He must depend entirely on the speaker's voice.

In a telephone conversation the best results are obtained by speaking slowly and distinctly in a normal tone of voice with lips close to but not touching the mouthpiece.

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
