

RACES WERE THRILLING AT C. POINT

Walter Fatch, Crown Point
Boy, Does Some Fast Riding in Big Meet.

CROWN POINT, Ind., Aug. 25.—The most sensational and speediest motorcycle races ever held in Crown Point attracted a big crowd here yesterday. The 5-mile professional twin.

Walter Fatch, a Crown Point boy, recently returned from France where he was connected with the air service, set the crowd wild by winning this race in a spectacular ride against the best in the country, breaking the track record, turning the five miles to the tune of 5:28. The track, hardened by a shower and the continued ironing of the motorcycles, became as smooth as glass and was never in better shape for speed as the time in this race demonstrated. Nielsen of Chicago was second and Hoover of Robert third.

In the 10-mile professional twin Walter Crepp collided with W. Fatch in the third lap, both taking a bad spill. Crepp was knocked unconscious and the accident took all the pep out of the racers for the afternoon while the crowd had its afternoon of thrills. Nielsen of Chicago was first and Hoover of Hobart, second. Time, 11:33.

The five mile single was captured by Ray Cramton Marion, Walter Fatch, Crown Point, 2nd, and George Gladback, of Anderson, 3rd. Time, 6:46.

In the 5-mile professional twin Nielsen was first, Hoosier 2nd and Fritz 3rd. In this race Nielsen broke Walter Fatch's previous track record of 5:28, winning it in 5:25.

In the 10-mile single M. Hoover was first, E. Hoover 2nd and J. Fritz 3rd. Time, 12:30.

The amateur twin stock was won by Anderson of Hammond; Tally, of Hammond, 2nd, and Katsbach, of Highland, third. Time, 6:10.

The 10-mile pro twin—Nelson of Chicago was first and Hoover of Hobart, 2nd. Time, 11:33.

The 5-mile side car race was won by H. Quintine, of Chicago; Bert Huff, Hobart, 2nd, and Mike Guick, 3rd. Time, 6:02.

Lined up with these contenders are the best tennis players in the country—young and old—and the tourney takes an international flavor with the presence of Ichiji Kumagae, of Japan, and the recently arrived Australian quartet.
