

## LAST PLANS FOR WELCOME DAY TONIGHT

Final preparations for the Welcome Home Day celebration will be completed this evening at a joint meeting of the Executive committee of the Welcome Home Day and the Park Board. The meeting will be held at the city hall and will be attended by representatives of the East Chicago and Indiana Harbor Red Cross chapters, Salvation Army, Knights of Columbus, Jewish Welfare, Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., and Boy Scouts of America.

Mr. Dreessen, agent of the Pennsylvania lines, has been appointed chairman of the transportation committee and will have full charge of transporting the returned soldiers and sailors from East Chicago and Indiana Harbor to the park. The appointment of Mr. Dreessen as chairman of the transportation leaves no doubt that the transportation will be well taken care of and that all of the returned soldiers and sailors will have no difficulty in getting to the celebration.

Attorney Royce, chairman of the Speakers committee, has secured Prof. Hall of Indianapolis to make the address. Prof. A. C. Burgin, chairman of the Program committee, and Charles Spurr, chairman of the Military Ball committee, have called meetings of their committees for this evening and will make their final arrangements at this time.

The Finance committee and the Drive committee will hold a meeting at the city hall tomorrow evening and at that time will endeavor to clean everything up so that the remainder of the committees will know just what they will have to do for the next week.

The Drive committee is now making its last urgent appeal for everyone to get busy and do their bit. It is important that all citizens of East Chicago and Indiana Harbor contribute as liberally to this drive as they have to all of the war drives in the past. This celebration will be the one and only means of showing the appreciation that the cities feel for the heroic service of their soldiers and sailors. All committees are determined that the affair is going to be a success and will not rest until their endeavors until success is assured.

Realizing that the time is short the city chairman is redoubling his efforts for this last week and is leaving nothing undone which might contribute to the success of the celebration. "Without a doubt," he says, "this celebration will be one of the most glorious in the history of the city."

## OLD BONES UNCOVERED

Workmen excavating for Carl Miller, the monument man at 4169 Broadway, Gary, last Saturday uncovered the skull, a part of a jaw bone and parts of bones of a human being.

## HOYNE CHARGES

Says That Race Riots Are Due to the Police Slush Fund.

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) CHICAGO, Aug. 25.—Arrest of several police was forecast today in the investigation which States Attorney Hoyne is making of the police department following his charges Saturday that the recent race riots were due to cheap grafting and petty politics. One policeman, Edward Mitchell, is in jail, charged with having accepted \$800 of a "slush" fund raised by negroes of the "black belt" for the prosecution of negroes engaged in the rioting.

The arrest of Mitchell followed a confession from "Cash" Harris, keeper of a notorious South Side gambling house, who, according to Hoyne, confessed that he was leader of a gang of negroes who had organized for a massacre of whites on July 4, Harris declared. Hoyne said, that Mitchell, who was dressed in plain clothes to arrest negro rioters, had not only taken the \$800 for himself, but had acted as "go-between" between the negroes and other policemen in arranging to buy off arrest of negroes implicated in the rioting.

In the wholesale raids of Saturday and yesterday, Hoyne declares, sufficient evidence was found to confirm the story of Harris that a massacre of whites had been planned. Large supplies of arms and ammunition, much of it smuggled to Chicago by Pullman porters, it is charged, were found in the fifty or more houses and cafes raided.
