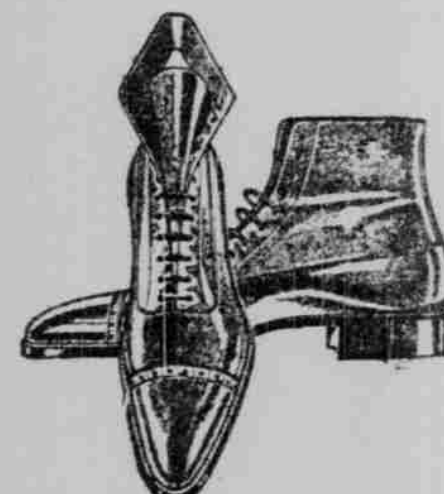

## STATE LABOR FEDERATION ASKS INQUIRY

(Continued from page one.)

necessary in Hammond because there is no trouble or threatened trouble.

Resolved, That a committee be appointed to confer with the governor of Indiana and request him to remove troops at once.

"Resolved, that the president and secretary of the State Federation of Labor immediately confer with United States Senators New and Watson, and Congressman Wood, requesting them to introduce a resolution in Congress calling for an immediate investigation of labor conditions in the plant, by reason of government work being done, with a view to eliminating deplorable working conditions and adjusting controversies."

Arch Hinch, chairman of the resolutions committee, remarked that the committee was "up a tree on the Hammond resolution" when he read it to the convention. The committee, according to Delegate Hinch, recommended no action on the resolution until the convention could communicate with William B. Wilson, secretary of labor, at Washington to ascertain what reports he had received that property of the United Housing Corporation near the plant was being threatened. He added that a tele-

gram received on Aug. 16, from Secretary Wilson by Governor Goodrich requested that he send troops to protect the housing corporation property.

An Indianapolis member of the committee, said that Chairman Hinch was in error as to the recommendation of the committee as they wanted the resolution acted upon without waiting for advice from Secretary Wilson.

**SAYS GOVERNOR IS "SHIELDED."**  
Charging that "someone was attempting to shield Governor Goodrich," W. P. Mullen, a delegate from the painters' union at Hammond, said that it appeared to him that Governor got himself in a hole and was wanting to "pass the buck" to Secretary Wilson.

Chairman Hinch took the statement to reflect upon his action and told the convention that he couldn't see the advantage of passing a resolution condemning the Governor's course and then telegraphing Secretary Wilson for facts as to the information he had received showing the necessity of state troops.

Delegate Mullen replied that he believed the Governor would have sent the troops to Hammond regardless of Secretary Wilson's request. He said it was "a part of capital's plan to disrupt unions." Ed Stewart, another member
