INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Aug. 28.—Women will have a large part in the Republican campaign in Indiana, according to indications at the opening meeting of the campaign here where plans of organization were discussed. The meeting was officially a meeting of the state committee, but members of the women's committee and many party leaders participated.

The announcement was made that women's headquarters will be opened at the Lovern Hotel September 1 and that Mrs. Cora Bennett Stephenson, of Marion, will have charge. Mrs. Stephenson was named secretary of the women's advisory committee.

In opening the meeting Edmund H. Wasmuth, state chairman, said that the event opened the campaign in the state. He laid much stress on the fact that the state committee will place nothing in the way of any candidate who desires to make the race for nomination for any office. He used the expression so often repeated by Will H. Hays, national chairman, that the province of the committee is to "select candidates and not to select them." He said the situation is bright and predicted an overwhelming Republican victory.

None of the frequently mentioned candidates for governor were present. Lawrence R. Lyons of Brook, a close friend of Warren T. McCray, said he expected Mr. McCray to announce his candidacy for governor soon.

WELL, IT WILL COST NEAT SUM

WASHINGTON, August 28.—An appropriation of \$825,000 to cover the expenses of the American peace commission to Paris to the payment of the present calendar year was asked by President Wilson in a message to congress yesterday afternoon.

The president's message declared

that the members of the American peace commission had been "very modest." He cited the high cost of food, fuel and transportation in France and said that due to war conditions many expensive means of communications had to be maintained and that it was necessary to keep a large courier corps.

The president declared that it was not possible for him to state when the work of the peace commission would be completed, but he believed that the maximum time that it would be in session would be the end of the present calendar year.

The president also rendered an accounting of the expenses of the American peace delegation from December 1, 1918, to June 30, 1919.

The expenses already accounted for will total \$1,506,776.63, he said.

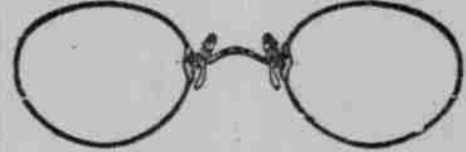

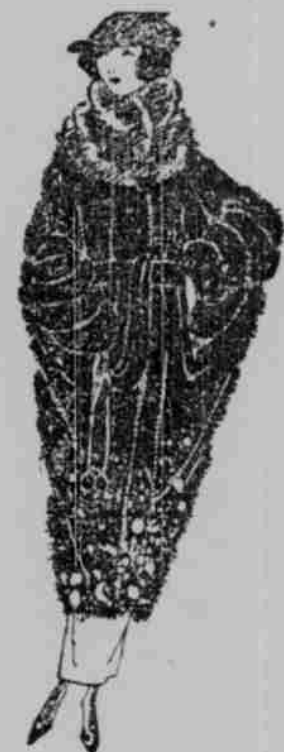

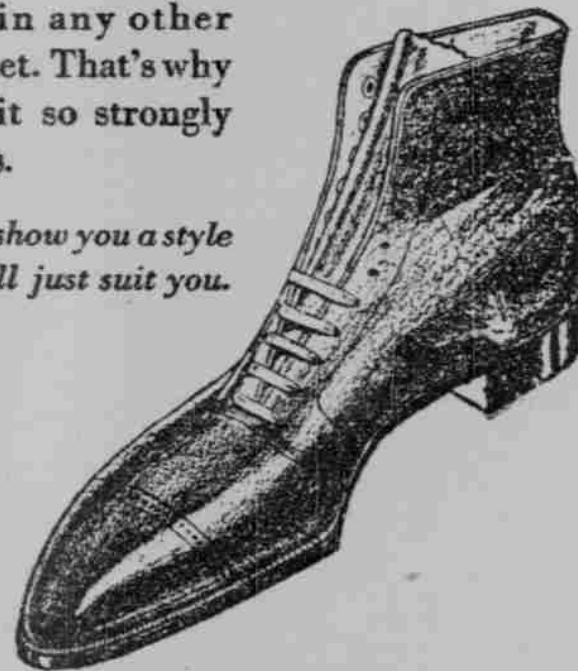
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
