was struck by a street car.

The fire department had received a call from Box 13, located on Oliver st. in the school grounds. Coming off White Oak ave., the fire truck swung onto 119th st., when they were struck from the rear by an east bound street car in charge of Motorman Edward C. Lockwood, 1375 E. 13th st., Chicago, and Conductor F. L. Hockins of 1159 Calumet ave., Chicago. The fire truck was driven by Ollie Weigand and it is said he was not going at an excessive rate of speed. The report is that the street car suddenly picked up velocity and crashed into the truck with an awful force. Leslie Miles, fireman, who was standing on the rear, was knocked off and received a bad scalp wound and an injured leg. He was taken to Dr. Putnam's office, following which he was removed to St. Margaret's hospital. Mike Neelon and Albert Zarndt, firemen, also received minor injuries, which, however, will not incapacitate them from their regular duties. The fire truck was badly smashed up by the collision, the Community Service "liver" also suffered the loss of a wheel and other damages, it having been parked in close proximity to the scene of the accident.

The accident happened at one of Whiting's busy and also dangerous corners. The passengers on the street car were given a bad shaking up but fortunately no one was injured. The crew was not taken into custody, but they will be brought here to make an explanation.

NEW JERSEY RATIFIES IT

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) TRENTON, N. J., Feb. 10.—The assembly of the New Jersey assembly

ratified the woman suffrage amendment by a vote of 54 to 24 early today, after a four-hour filibuster, led by Democrats, had failed. The state senate had ratified the amendment last week. The gallery was filled with women who cheered and waved suffrage banners when the result of the vote was announced this morning. New Jersey is the twenty-ninth state to ratify the amendment enfranchising women. Seven more state ratifications of the amendment are necessary to make the constitutional amendment effective.

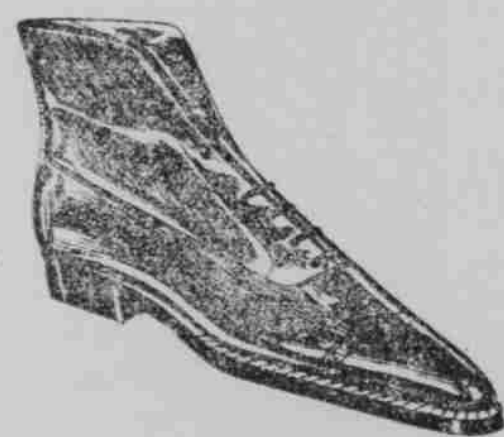

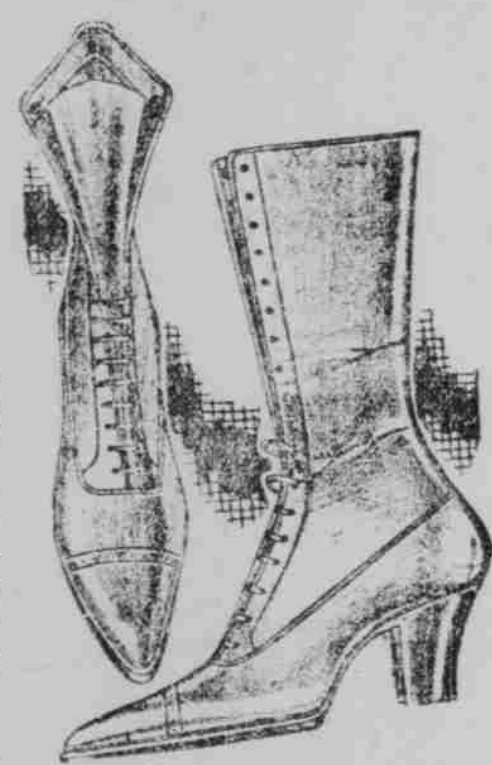
