DEATH RECORD IN TWIN CITIES

Deaths in the Twin Cities dropped during February almost to normal and the number of births jumped to a little more than the usual number. With the decrease in the number of deaths from "flu" and pneumonia, the total number for the month shows only 42 while during the same period 129 babies were added to the population.

The report of deaths shows that the city's health is no longer threatened by contagious diseases—"flu" pneumonia being the only disease usually feared


as contagious although they are not classed so by the state or city health authorities. Eleven of the 42 deaths were from pneumonia while 6 more were from "flu." The other 25 deaths were from twelve different causes.

East Chicago forged ahead of Indiana Harbor in the birth record, showing 37 boys and 35 girls against 26 boys and 22 girls from the Harbor.

8400 EAST CHICAGO'S QUOTA

The East Chicago Chamber of Commerce has been assigned a quota of 1400 to be raised among the members of the organization toward the construction of a \$2,500,000 structure to house the United States Chamber of Commerce in Washington. Work is expected to start early this spring.

The building will be located on eight lots in the heart of Washington known as "the old Corcoran place" and which

is famous as the home of Daniel Webster, Francis Scott Key, W. W. Corcoran, who founded the Corcoran Art Gallery, and other distinguished citizens. The site which in 1802 was assessed at two cents a square foot was purchased by the National Chamber of Commerce for \$700,000.

BOARD WANTS BIDS.

The East Chicago Park Board has advertised for bids on the improvement of the parks which was authorized by the city council and the state tax board when the board was given permission to issue \$200,000 worth of bonds. The board asks for bids on the landscape work on the Alder and 135th street park, the Alder and 135th street park, the Washington park, the north side park and Calumet park. It is estimated that this improvement should cost between \$100,000 and \$125,000.

The remainder of the \$200,000 will be used for construction of swimming pools, wading pools, a residence for the park superintendent and improvements to the proposed greenhouse. All bids must be in to the city clerk's office by March 3rd.

BRITAIN IS FACED WITH BIG STRIKE

LONDON, March 11.—The threat of a general strike of coal miners to enforce the nationalization of mines by the government hung over the country when the Trade Union Congress met in special session today. The meeting is generally regarded as one of the most important ever held by the congress, which is made up of representatives of all branches of organized labor.

STRIKE VOTE TAKEN

The miners have already voted in favor of a national strike to force the government to take over the mines by a majority of nearly 150,000, and the leaders of the federation of miners declare that they will have the backing of the other two branches of labor's triple alliance—the transport workers and the railroad men—if it comes to an open fight.

LLOYD GEORGE SHUNS IT

The Lloyd George government persistently has refused to adopt the policy of nationalization, despite the pressure from organized labor. In a statement to the house of commons, the premier declared that any attempt by the miners to seek a test of strength by "direct action" would be treated by the government as "rebellion."

The Congress represents 6,000,000 members of which 700,000 votes are held by the miners.

ENGLAND LUKEWARM FOR IT

If the last industrial crisis—the railway strike—is a reliable criterion, it is possible that labor leaders, other than miners, will act as a mediating body between the government and the Federation of Miners in the present dispute.

The coal miners have been conducting widespread propaganda but it has not had the effect anticipated. Public interest on nationalization has been only lukewarm.

However, in all parliamentary debates on coal situation, the miners have more than "held their own" in argumentative battles with the government, although the latter has always possessed a steam roller vote.

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
