EXPORTING OF GOLD IS VERY HEAVY

Steady Drain Upon American Gold Supply is But Slightly Offset by Imports According to Federal Reserve.

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) WASHINGTON, March 18.—The outflow of American gold to foreign countries now exceeds \$1,000,000 a day, reports to the treasury indicated today. Gold exports at this rate far exceed the record marks established last year, and heavier demands calling for still larger shipments, indicate exports may overtop the present high total. Federal reserve board officials today estimated that gold exports for 1920 may reach \$400,000,000.

Tabulations on the shipments of the precious metal abroad show that South America gets the larger share. Practically one-third of the gold shipped since January 1 has gone to countries in Argentina. Almost equally large shipments went to China and Japan.

The steady drain upon the American gold supply is but slightly offset by imports. Imports scarcely amount to one-eighth of exports.

Federal reserve board officials saw no occasion for alarm for the heavy export record now being steadily maintained. Officials pointed to latest figures showing total gold assets of the U. S. both in gold coin and bullion amount to \$2,615,000,000. This is made up of \$423,000,000 gold coin and \$1,729,000,000 gold bullion.

As against the great gold supply still available there is still listed in Uncle Sam's liabilities column gold certificates outstanding amounting to \$331,000,000. The gold settlement fund totals \$1,151,000,000. Gold reserve amounts to \$102,000,000. These reserves \$223,425,000 available gold in the general fund.

Twin City Republicans Hear McCray

The Republican meeting at the Twin City McKinley Club rooms in Indiana Harbor was voted by all who attended to be "one in a life-time" and almost impossible of duplication in the country. The assembly started promptly at seven thirty and continued with very little interruption until almost eleven holding the interest of the hall full of people until the last.

Warren McCray was the first speaker of the evening, although not a part of the program proper, and gave a talk which was well received and showed that his candidacy met with the favor of most present. Lawrence Lyons, district chairman, also made a short talk and Ray Boyce of East Chicago represented the East Chicago Republicans in a short presentation speech for the picture of President McKinley. The other speakers were the same as announced for the original program and each carried the picture to be given to the Twin City Club.

Webster Davis, John Kilgrew, Joseph Brown, Edwin Fredericks and Oscar Ahlgren each did honor to the cause which they represented by their manner of delivery and although practically all took more than their allotted fifteen minutes there were no objections and all remained in the hall until the last speech was made.

The only serious drawback of the meeting was the limited space in the hall and half of the crowd who reached the building were unable to get inside. Candidates arrived early and worked hard all evening passing out handshakes and cards and getting acquainted with the representatives of the cities in the county. Ladies carried in small numbers and were given seats of honor near the front of the hall. All nationalities and colors were represented, making a truly representative audience.

INDIANA MEN AT HOOVER MEETING

R. H. Barry of the Gary Land Co. and H. E. Barnard, former food administrator of Indiana, attended the Hoover meeting in Chicago yesterday when plans were made to organize the middle west states in a campaign for the presidential nominee on the Republican ticket.

The meeting was held at the Blackstone Hotel and Mr. Barry and Mr. Barnard were present as the Indiana representatives. Representatives of eleven states attended at the invitation of Ralph Arnold, a California mining engineer, who started the California boom for Hoover several months ago.

It will be remembered that Mr. Barnard was food administrator during Hoover's term as national food administrator and Mr. Barry also acted in the capacity of national food administrator. Mr. Barnard is now located at Minneapolis, Minn., as the director in charge of the Institute of Baking.

Within a few days in Chicago headquarters will be opened for Hoover who can raise the Indiana primary, ahead of a native-born son, Governor Lowden, despite the fact that he was not an avowed candidate and despite the failure of the primary.

PRACTICE CONDEMNED BY STATE OFFICIALS

Health Officers Not Permitted to Charge Fees for School Children's Birth Certificates.

According to information which came to Lake county today, the practice of many health officers in Indiana of charging fees for birth certificates to children of school age who desire to leave school and obtain employment, is illegal, state officials said today.

Jesse Eschbach, state examiner for the board of accounts, said that he has notified his examiners throughout the state that such fees must be charged back to the health officers, and the state board of health has sent out a letter to all county, city and town health officers advising them to stop the practice of collecting fees for this service.

The letter of the board of health points out that "the practice imposes a hardship on children in many instances and is, in the opinion of the state board, directly contrary to the law and spirit of both the child labor law and the health law of the state."

The child labor law provides employers before hiring children of school age must require a copy of the birth certificate showing the age of the child and places the responsibility of obtaining the certificate on the child.

As the health officer is the legal custodian of birth records, he is the proper officer from whom birth certificates may be obtained. The child labor law makes no provision for a fee for the issuing of birth certificates.

The state industrial board has received many complaints from all parts of the state against the charging of fees by health officers. The board took up the matter with the board of accounts and board of health. It was said that fees ranging from 50 cents to \$2 had been charged.

SAYS CHARLIE CHAPLIN NO LAUGHING MATTER

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) LOS ANGELES, Calif., March 18.—Charlie Chaplin's screen antics in making an entire nation laugh gave him no time to create an atmosphere of happiness at his family bedside, according to his wife, Mildred Harris Chaplin, who announced today that she would seek a legal separation from the film comedian.

Mrs. Chaplin did not make it clear whether she would file suit for divorce or for separate maintenance.

In a newspaper interview, Mrs. Chaplin, herself a motion picture actress, declared that her husband's coldness and neglect had made her life with him unbearable for her.

"He finally deserted me altogether after threatening that unless I accept a settlement of \$25,000 from him and file suit for divorce in Nevada, he would start such a suit against me," said Mrs. Chaplin.

Following this, he had detectives follow me everywhere.

"But he has no grounds on which to sue me. I do not want a divorce nor his money, but I must have support. He has refused to pay my bills, and I was forced to return to work after our baby's death much sooner than I should have done, because it was necessary for me to support members of my family dependent on me. "I hate to break up our home, but I just couldn't stand it any longer." Since Chaplin left her, she declared, he has been living at the Los Angeles Athletic Club.
