

NO HOME BUILDING FOR S. O. CO.

(SPECIAL TO THE TIMES) WHITING, IND.—March 26—Great disappointment was manifested here today because of the word received from Chicago that the Standard Oil Company will have no home building program in Whiting for the year 1920. The information is unofficial, but comes from a reliable source. This will be a disappointment to a large number of employees who hoped and expected that the company would come to the relief of the home seekers.

About four hundred homes are needed in Whiting at the present time. Many of the Standard Oil employees had hoped that the company would purchase a tract of land and build several hundred houses to be sold at cost at low interest rates.

For the past two months the market of dwellings has been a very live question in the Board of Industrial Relations at the Standard Oil plant, and many hundred of the employees are said to have signed cards indicating their willingness to purchase homes on monthly payments.

STATE HAMPERED IN CASE OF EPILEPTICS

(TIMES BUREAU AT STATE CAPITAL) INDIANAPOLIS, March 26.—Because of the high prices of building materials plans for the development of the women's section of the Village for Epileptics, Newcastle, have been abandoned until prices are lower or additional funds are allowed for the expansion of the institution. It has been announced by the board of state charities. At present less than 25 per cent. of the persons afflicted in Indiana are receiving institutional care and treatment, the board announces. Only 1,159 of the 4,700 epileptics in the state are being cared for in institutions, and of the number being treated only 551 are in the Newcastle village. The others are inmates of five insane institutions, the School for Feeble Minded Youths and county poor asylums. All the cottages at the Newcastle village are for men and boys. With the appropriation of needed funds it is hoped to expand the village so that it will care for all the afflicted in the state.

Georgia Youth Plays Music on Common Saw

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) THOMASVILLE, Ga., March 26.—In a recent issue of a national hardware journal young Sam Moore, Jr., formerly of Monticello, Fla., and whose father was a Thomasville man, is shown playing on a saw as an instrument of music.

The Moore family has always been noted for its musical talent, and when young Moore went to work in a factory where he used a saw he was in the habit of standing with the saw in his hand and not at work of hitting tuning on it. Finally he began playing tunes on the teeth with the bow of his violin, and found he could make good music that way.

He has signed an engagement to go with a show troupe, where he will be featured in his role of drawing music from a common saw.

Spokane Catholic Priests Granted Salary Increase

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) WASHINGTON, March 26.—Parish priests of the Catholic diocese of Spokane have been granted an increase in salary, according to a statement issued by Bishop Skinner. The raise in salary amounts to \$100 a year, making \$1,000 with household and living expenses paid, which latter are provided for by parishioners. The increase will affect about fifty priests in the Spokane diocese. The salaries of assistant priests have been increased from \$300 to \$400 a year, with the living and household expenses included.

Kidnaped Child Makes His Escape

Locked for 48 Hours in the
Bathroom, Kentucky Boy
Finally Gets Out.

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) LEXINGTON, Ky., March 26—Paul Little, the 12-year-old son of E. R. Little who was kidnapped here two days ago, escaped from his captors at 7 o'clock this morning. He had been locked up for more than 48 hours in a bathroom, adjoining a bed room of the Phoenix hotel.

This morning his jailers left the room with the bathroom door unlocked. The boy crept out and seized the telephone. He called his home and a few minutes later his father, accompanied by Chief of Police J. J. Reagan, and a squad of policemen, broke down the door. The boy leaped into his father's arms.

"I'm all right, daddy," he cried. "Don't sleep any more."

Chief Reagan immediately gave orders to his men to comb the city for the kidnappers. The boy gave an excellent description of the men and their arrest was thought to be a matter of a few hours.

The boy said he had been held in the hotel room ever since his disappearance Wednesday afternoon. His captors warned him if he screamed his throat would be cut.

But this morning, through a bit of carelessness the key of the bath room was not turned. The boy heard the outer door closed and locked. He waited until he thought the man had left the hotel and then made his way cautiously to the telephone.

He whispered the number of his home. His father answered. Then the boy returned to the bath room, his heart beating violently.

The next thing he remembered, there came a series of smashing blows on the outer door leading to the hallway.

As the door came down, the boy sprang out and was clasped to his father's breast.

When asked to show credentials, the young man was unable to produce. Then the three others came into the lobby, but their stories did not coincide, neither did they find accommodations at the "Y."

They were seen boarding a rattle for Valparaiso the following morning.

DOOMED MAN WANTED NO LECTURE

He had just told Justice Fawcett that he did not do the actual shooting.
