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ROAD STILL A DEATHTRAP.

In referring editorially to the lamentable Stingley horror on Lake George boulevard a Gary newspaper says that the safest roads are the most dangerous and fewest deaths occur on the most dangerous roads.

The newspaper calls the boulevard a safe road which is in direct contradiction to the facts. The Lake George boulevard is one of the worst death-traps of any road in Lake county and there is nothing safe about it.

It is a fact that scores of motorists refuse to travel on it at night. The number of accidents that have happened on the thoroughfare is appalling.

It is banded on both sides by a deep treacherous body of water for quite a distance and after the Stingley-Younger tragedy last fall public opinion was deeply stirred.

Demands were voiced that the thoroughfare be protected in some way so that the hundreds upon hundreds of motorists who use daily what has turned out to be a speedway might do so in safety.

Lake George boulevard is a dangerous road. In no sense is it safe and no statement to the contrary can make it anything but a menace to automobile traffic.

The Board of County Commissioners should take steps to make it safe at points especially where deep water comes to the road side and should do so before fresh accidents occur.

MEANING OF AMERICANISM.

The American Legion will attempt to obtain a definition of "Americanism," one that will embrace all that the name implies and that will be accepted as the true meaning of the term.

As frequently the word is used it is not likely that any two persons would define it in the same way. Yet a correct and definite understanding of what it meant when the word is employed is needed. The definition should be short, yet comprehensive. It should be expressed in simple language.

It should be broad, yet affording no place for the unpatriotic to stand.

The demand for an expression of the meaning is required in order to make clear to all for what the American Legion stands. The Legion has pledged itself to defend and support Americanism, and it wants a concrete statement of its platform so that there can be no misunderstanding of its principles.

The effort to reduce Americanism to definite terms is commendable. If an acceptable definition is framed it will convey an exact meaning whenever used. It will remove the term from individual interpretation.

Even the revolutionist who plots the overthrow of the government by armed force and bloodshed will contend that he is an American, but he applies his own construction of what Americanism means.

The two million members of the American Legion by their acts have demonstrated that they know what Americanism means. It remains for them to express the meaning in words.

LOOK TO THE TEETH.

If it be true as reported, that Viscount Grey's eyesight has been restored, the rejoicing of friends will not be confined to the other side of the ocean, but will extend to wherever solid character and eminent abilities are held in admiration. The original announcement of Lord Grey's misfortune was received with sorrow throughout the world. The memory of his services to civilization, his earnest efforts to prevent the great war and his statesmanlike conduct as British minister of foreign affairs, was still keen in the public mind. Later came more encouraging news that his blindness might be only partial and he accepted the temporary appointment of ambassador to the United States.

And if reports are accurate, it was a fortunate thing that he did decide in spite of his disability to accept that call to duty. For it is said that owing to the skill of an American dentist the underlying cause of his trouble was discovered and removed and Lord Grey feels his strength and ambition so far restored and he is planning to return to active political life.

The incident calls attention to the increasingly important part scientific dentistry is coming to play in the prevention and cure of diseases formerly thought to be beyond its province. We now know that all sorts of ailments, once considered entirely unrelated to the teeth, are due to their unhealthy condition. Discoveries of this nature are becoming the commonplace of medical practice.

The increasing attention paid to the teeth of children should make for a sturdier stock of humanity.

TO BRING HOME THE DEAD.

Secretary Baker's decision permits both sides to have their wishes respected, leaving only the final move to be carried out—disinterment of the dead to be returned to their native land and formal contract with the French government for the care of the graves of those who remain where they died.

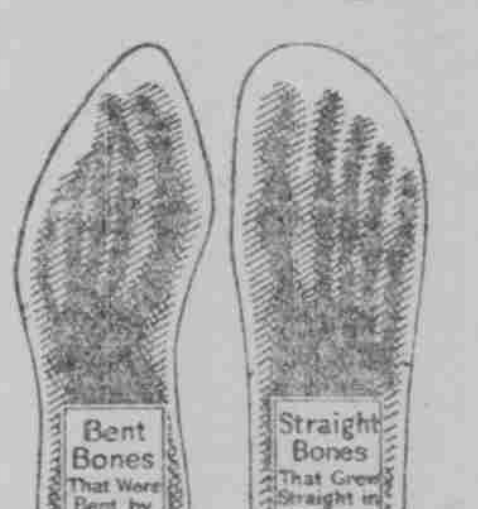
