Mrs. Margaret Buchler of Amy ave. was a visitor in Chicago on Friday.

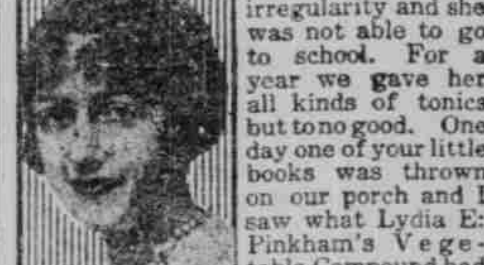

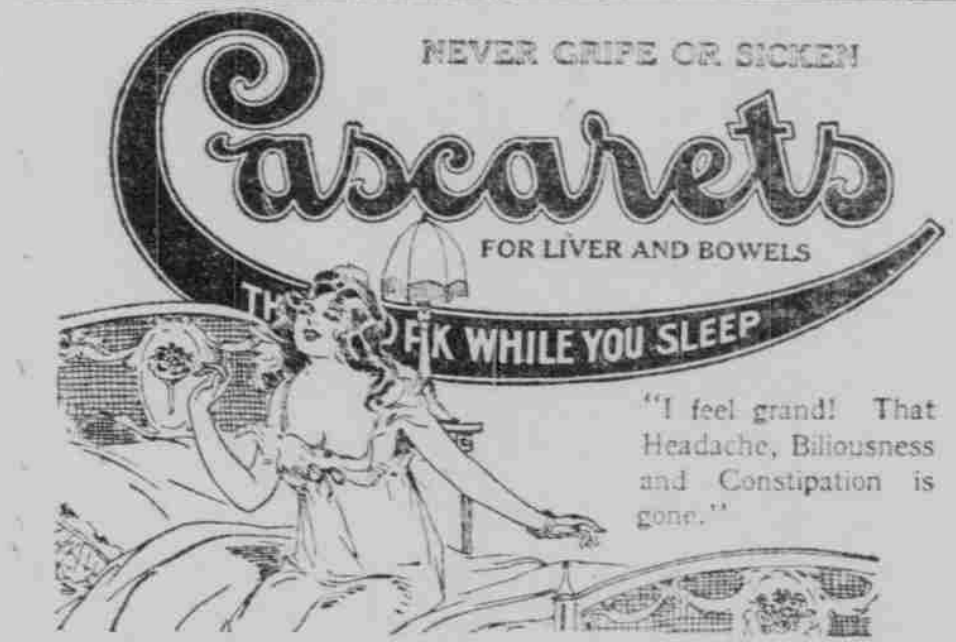
