SUGGESTS USE OF MACHINE GUNS

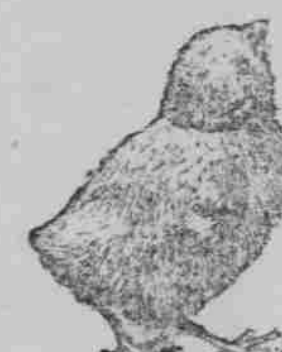
