Hammond Track Team Schedule

With fair weather remaining for a week, Coach George Venable of Indiana high school hopes to whip his track team into fair shape for the regular meet here on April 24. Hindered by lack of material, Hammond's chances in the track events of the county are looked upon as slim, but the unexpected is not impossible and you never can tell. The air around Hammond high school is permeated with "We Will" spirit and some of the twenty-five lads now training on the cinder path are sure to develop into championship class.

The first event of the season will be a triangular meet at Hammond Park, April 24. Whiting and East Chicago are sending some fast runners and competition will be keen. On May 15 sectional events all over the state will be held under the auspices of the State High School Athletic Association. LaPorte has been chosen for this district and track teams from all Southern Indiana will be entered. The schedule of elimination is similar to that used in basketball tournaments except that men winning first and second places in each event in the sectional track meet will be eligible to enter the

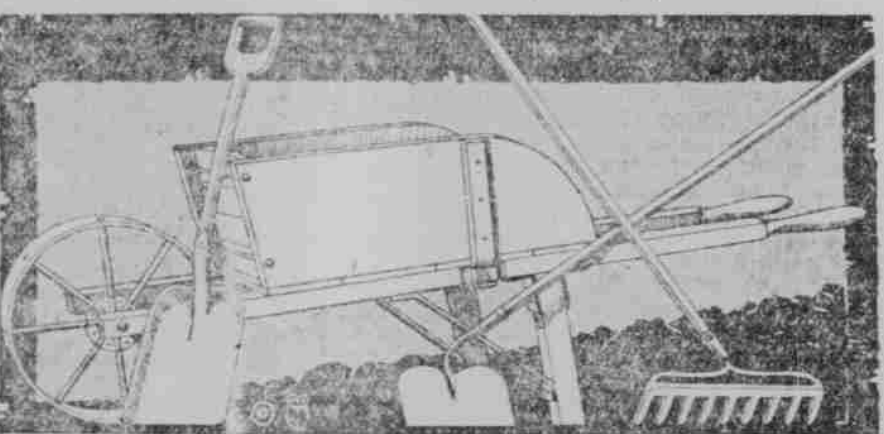
