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A FOMENTER OF DISORDER.

Kansas is being forced at present to deal with a loud-mouthed blatant radical named Alexander Howat and the nation at large as a consequence, having heard of little else but radicalism for two years gazes toward Kansas with no new astonishment.

The attitude of Alexander Howat who is head of the Kansas coal miners' organization, and who says he will not recognize the industrial relations court of that state, is typical of the trouble-making spirit that leads to radicalism.

"We won't recognize this court," he told a Kansas crowd. "It is composed of three corporation lawyers appointed by that skunk of a Governor Allen." He further paid his respects to the judge who sent him to jail for contempt.

Yesterday Howat continued to hurl defiance at law and order. He had been permitted to address a miners' parade from the jail steps, a very coarse piece of work for which the sheriff was responsible.

If the law of Kansas is broken by Howat, the place for him is on the inside not the outside of jail. It is just such trouble-makers that are setting this nation by the ears.

They lead to lawlessness galore. Freedom of speech is one thing and Alexander Howat's incendiary gabfests are another.

WHY SHOULD SHE ESCAPE?

Press dispatches say that a good deal of influence is being brought to bear in California to stop the judicial inquiry into the Pickford-Moore divorce case in Nevada. These appeal share been made to Attorney General Fowler who has found evidence of illegality and says:

"I want to make it plain to every one that I am going on with this case and that nothing can deter me," said Fowler.

INTEREST OF PUBLIC PARAMOUNT.

The strike of so-called "outlaw" railroad men, principally employees of the yards, again demands that the public take a firm and prompt stand for its rights.

While no one disputes the right of workmen to strike, when no other means are available, sudden cessation of work, and particularly in industries that the up or cripple many others, is unjust and intolerable. It means that thousands of men satisfied with their pay and working conditions may be thrown out of employment by a small body of men acting arbitrarily in one of the vital industries.

The railroads, the arteries of the country's life and commerce must not be subject to such disorders. The business of the country must not be permitted to be paralyzed by any group. And that people have demonstrated that they will not endure it. Having brought about amicable means of adjusting differences, they have no patience with the workmen who resort to strikes before other methods have been exhausted.

If ought to be the concern of every American just now to aid in solving the problems of reconstruction. Adding to unrest by a strike, and particularly without waiting for arbitration, is just the opposite of the spirit desired.

An end must be put to attempts of little groups of the people to attain their ends by paralyzing or crippling the business of the whole people.

The switchmen are deserving of more pay but they should not take radical means to obtain higher wages.
