igan Central yards last night, railroad officials were optimistic today and declared they believe the strike would be over within a few days.



## SHOCKING STORY FROM BURNHAM

A new and startling angle in the murder of the six months' old Burnham baby girl who died Monday from alleged mistreatment at the hands of a moron, developed yesterday when the mother of the child, Mrs. Anna Gremrich, 2937 East 128th place, was ordered into custody by Deputy-coroner E. W. Dierich of Cook county, following an inquest held in Burnham.

The mother is booked on an open charge and is held at the Detention Home pending a complete investigation by State's Attorney Heyne. The inquest yesterday afternoon was continued until April 22 when it is expected the mother will be formally charged with murder.

Dr. Stanley Brown, consulting physician at St. Margaret's hospital who was called Friday afternoon to attend the child, whom the mother said she found crying in agony after she had left the infant alone in a crib for half an hour ordered the victim to St. Margaret's hospital. The baby was later taken home where she died.

Following the mother's story the eyes went up to him a "moron" who had attacked the infant. A man of the Fitzsimons type was said to have been the murderer. Later investigation cast suspicion upon the mother and her story is now looked upon by police as pure fabrication.

According to officer Herman Fader of Burnham station, Dr. Stanley Brown testified at the inquest that from the nature of the wounds, the child at first appeared to have been attacked. A closer examination proved the injuries were directly due to intentional mistreatment with murder probably the motive.

Neighbors testified that they saw no one about the house at the time the mother alleges she left the infant alone.

### S. BILSKI IS DEAD

Stanley Bilski, 17 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Bilski, 419 156th Street, died Tuesday afternoon, April 12th, of

several cans of beans, together with the testimony of people, who ironed 12 sets other cans from the same lot, are expected to decide whether or not Abe Bilski, Indiana Harbor, grocer, must pay the \$370 which the Stevenson-Ben Co. says is still due on the lot delivered in October, 1915.

Bilski's cross-examined and answered that the beans were old, hard and unfit for human consumption and that because of the sale of a number of cans before he learned of their poor quality, he lost a number of his best customers. He says he should have \$100 damages instead of paying anything to the wholesalers. Attorney Dave Boone is appearing for the plaintiff while Charles Dyer is attorney for the defendant.

The case is being heard by Judge Hardy and a jury in Room 2 of the Hammond superior court.

ORDINANCE NO. 1582.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY FOR HEAVY HAULING ON ANY OF THE IMPROVED STREETS IN THE CITY OF HAMMOND, INDIANA.

Section 1. BE IT ORDAINED by the

Common Council of the City of Ham-

mond, Indiana, that it shall be and is

hereby unlawful for any person to haul

over any street in the City of Hammond, Indiana, improved with a modern pavement or macadam pavement, any vehicle, when the combined weight of the vehicle together with the driver, shall exceed ten (10) tons in weight.

PROVIDED, that any person, firm or corporation desiring to haul a heavier load than ten (10) tons, after having first shown the necessity for so doing to the Board of Public Works, whose decision shall be final and conclusive, and in said Board so decides that a necessity exists for so doing, it shall then issue an order to the Controller of said City to issue said person, firm or corporation, a temporary permit to haul a greater load than ten (10) tons, as provided for in this Section, and

PROVIDED, that any policeman of the City of Hammond or any Councilman of the City of Hammond, or the Mayor of the City of Hammond, shall have police power to arrest upon sight, any person who is seen violating this Section, or by warrant, any person who has violated any of the provisions of this Section, within the limits of said City of Hammond.

Any person violating any provision of this Section, shall, on conviction, be fined not less than Five Dollars (\$5.00) nor more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for each load so hauled.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately after its passage and approval by the Mayor and due publication.
