An Independent Candidate.

I represent in my candidacy no special interest, directly or indirectly. "I realize and shall recognize the great help that must come to the chief executive of the state from frequent conference with those who desire to discuss matters affecting the welfare of the state, and it shall be my policy to invite suggestions and welcome co-operation from all."

#### CREOLE SOUP.

Take one large can of tomatoes, four tablespoons of rice, two onions, two small turnips, two small carrots, four cups of water, two tablespoons of butter and two teaspoons of salt. Peel and slice the carrots, turnips and onions. Cook these vegetables with tomatoes and salt in the water. Boil rice in separate pan until tender. When vegetables are tender, rub all through a colander. Add butter, rice and sufficient water to make two quarts. Season with salt and paprika and serve hot.

### POTATOES IN MOLDS.

Mash twelve boiled potatoes, add one-fourth cup of melted butter, one egg and beat until light. Then add one-half cup of grated cheese, salt and paprika to taste. Pack into greased individual molds, cover, and steam steadily for one hour. Turn out, sprinkle with grated cheese and serve hot.

### SALMON LOAF.

Take one small can of salmon, two eggs beaten lightly, four tablespoons of butter substitute, half a cup of fine bread crumbs. Season with salt, pepper and minced parsley. First chop the fish, then rub in the butter substitute until smooth. Beat the crumbs with the eggs, and season before mixing together. Put in a buttered mold, and steam for one hour; when cold arrange on a platter with a border of parsley.

### CALIFORNIA FRUIT CAKE.

One cup butter substitute, 4 cups of sugar, 1 cup of sweet milk, 4 cups of flour, two teaspoons baking powder, whites of 8 eggs.

One teaspoon of raisins, about four or five figs, 1 ounce of chopped almonds, half a cup of water.

Cream the butter until light and fluffy, add two cups sugar. Sift flour several times. Add flour and milk alternately, then beat the butter until smooth. Have the whites of eggs well beaten and fold in and mix thoroughly. Last add the baking powder sifted with the eggs, beating constantly. Divide into equal parts, putting fruits and nuts into the one-half of which is spread between the layers, and using the plain portion on the top of cake.

## WILL SURVEY GARY AGENCIES FOR RELIGION

The Interchurch World Movement is planning a thorough and scientific survey of all the religious education agencies of Gary. A company of ten or more specialists will arrive in this city on Thursday of next week to begin the work of this survey.

This team has been at work for several weeks in other parts of the country. They are at present just completing a study of the Sunday Schools and other religious educational agencies in Boston, Mass. They have also completed surveys in Brooklyn, East Orange, N. J., Malden, Mass. and Somerset County, N. J.

Cities and counties typical of various kinds of community have been chosen at various points of the country. Gary has been chosen as a type of modern industrial center, hence the findings here will have more than local value and temporary interest. The work here also promises special interest because of the week-day schools of religion for which Gary has become widely known in religious educational circles.

There will be a mass meeting at the Y. M. C. A. Auditorium on Thursday evening, April 22, at eight o'clock for the purpose of setting up the survey. Either Dr. Hollins of Cincinnati or Dr. Campbell of Boston will speak. Both of these men are leaders in the educational thought of today and all who are at all interested in the religious nurture of young people ought to avail themselves of this opportunity to hear a masterful presentation of this great theme.

All pastors, Sunday School superintendents, officers and teachers are especially urged to be present. The ten members of the survey team will be present and will wish to meet the Sunday School people of the churches that they are to study. The work of the survey will be greatly helped if all churches are adequately represented at this set-up meeting.

The team contains such men as Prof. Gray, who was for nine years Professor of English in the University of Maine, Dr. Theodore Noon of the Anti-Saloon League, Prof. Hollins of Boston, Dr. Sanford of Boston and other persons of widely known ability.

The coming of these religious education experts offers to Gary an opportunity to lay hold upon the best and most approved methods in the important field of religious nurture. At the same time the splendid attainments which Gary has made along these lines promises to them a fruitful field and one from which they hope to carry the helpful suggestions all over the country.
