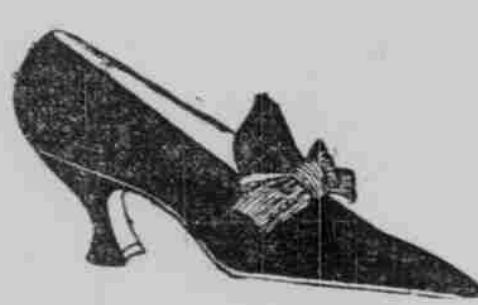

## GOAT GLAND EXPERT GUEST OF BETZ CO.

Hammond had the honor yesterday of entering one of the most prominent figures of the medical profession today in the person of Dr. J. R. Brinkley, famed for the marvelous results that have followed in experiments in transplanting goat glands to the human body.

Dr. Brinkley, who resides at Milwaukee, Kas., where he is maintaining a large hospital, crowded to capacity since he announced his success in the new surgery, has for years been a valued customer of the F. S. Betz company of Hammond. The hospital equipment with which he performs his wonderful feats came from the Hammond plant. Yesterday he stopped at Hammond while on his way to New York where a number of capitalists are ready to back him in erecting a large hospital if he will locate here.

Believing that members of the medical profession and other Hammond people as well would like to meet him the officials of the Betz company arranged to have the surgeon speak at the noon-day luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce. Practically all of the physicians of Hammond and a number from neighboring cities were present. The meeting was one of the most interesting since the luncheons were inaugurated.

Dr. Brinkley modestly and as briefly as possible, described the work that he had set out to accomplish and the success which has attended his efforts. By transplanting interstitial glands from goats to the human body he has been able to cure insanity, restore eyesight and bring back vigor to persons on whom old age had laid placed its stamp. The wide publicity which has caused patients to flock to his sanitarium from all parts of the world so that he is now swamped with work. If he accepts the proposition of the New York capitalists he will be able with a larger corps of assistants to attend to many more patients than his present equipment will permit.

## Allies Make Demand On Germany

PARIS, April 16.—The foreign office today authorized the statement that France, Belgium, Italy and England have agreed upon the demand that Germany at once take measures for immediate disarmament of her army, as provided in the peace treaty.

If Germany refuses, the allied powers have agreed to suspend diplomatic relations with Berlin. Furthermore, the allies are united upon the proposal to put a new blockade in force if a new German military coup is successful.

It is understood that the agreement will put in writing when the inter-allied supreme council meets at San Remo next week.

## WESTERN UNION HEAD IS DEAD

BALTIMORE, Md., April 16.—Theodore N. Vail, chairman of the board of directors of the American Telephone and Telegraph Co., and long a noted figure in the telephone and telegraph world, died this morning at the hospital of John Hopkins University.

Heart trouble and complications resulting from an illness from which he was a sufferer during the past year, were the immediate causes of death.

For the past month Mr. Vail had been recuperating at Jekyll Island, off the Georgian coast, which is the center of homes of many prominent families.

He came to Baltimore and entered the hospital at Johns Hopkins University the first of this week. His death came early this morning. He is survived by Mrs. Vail, who accompanied him to Baltimore from his Jekyll Island home.
