

Bring Back Troops Says Sen. Capper

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) WASHINGTON, April 17.—Recall of all U. S. troops in Europe was urged by Senator Capper, republican of Kansas, in a statement made public today.

"It is our business to keep out and entirely out of Europe's family row," Capper said.

"The place of every American soldier now in Europe is home. The government should recall every one in uniform from foreign soil. Let them go home. We must leave the rest to nature and instinct. Having nothing left to fight for and having no quarrel with anybody, the 13,000 American soldiers should come home.

"The results of the war have been so disastrous and far reaching to our own national life that the people and the country are now seeking eagerly for positive men with leadership to get us out of the ditch."

EXPECT STRIKE END WITHIN 60 HOURS

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) CHICAGO, April 17.—Railroad officials and brotherhood chiefs here confidently expect a complete ending of the switchmen's strike in the Chicago district within the next sixty hours, they declared today.

They based this hope not only on the action by the railroad authorities in arresting the strike leaders and the gradual restoration of freight traffic despite the strike, but also on what apparently is a changed attitude on the part of John Grunau and other strike leaders. The latter appeared optimistic concerning a settlement of the strike for the first time since the walkout began. This change of front occurred after they were released from federal detention on their own recognizance following their refusal to give bail.

The strikers will hold a mass meeting late today and it is predicted that action which will result in their return to work will be taken.

It may never come true, it is little more than a hope—a bare possibility perhaps, but Major Lee, secretary of the Calumet Manufacturing Association, says that the City of Chicago is going to repair Indianapolis boulevard just beyond the state line. The association has been urging the officials of the metropolis to make the improvement for months. Cook county had not the legal power, the Eighth Ward has no funds and dignitaries of other bodies passed the buck.

Finally, however, as a result of constant efforts of the Calumet Manufacturers Association, supplemented by pleas from various bodies of Northern Indiana, the city council of Chicago, was prevailed upon to make the necessary appropriation and, we are informed, the work will be done as soon as the weather permits.

The street is the main thoroughfare from Chicago to the southeast and for about a mile on the Illinois side has been in a deplorable condition for a long time. If the improvement is made—and we do not believe it yet—but just supposing—every auto driver in Lake County and most of the rest of the populace will shout loud hurrahs.

GERMANY'S DEBT IS 49 BILLIONS

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) LONDON, April 16. (Delayed.)—The total debt of Germany is 121,000,000,000. Minister of Finance Wirth today informed the finance committee of the national assembly. The funded debt is 12,000,000,000 marks and the floating debt 109,000,000 marks.

At the present rate of exchange 121,000,000,000 marks would be worth about \$3,250,000,000 in American money. In normal times it would be \$4,450,000,000.

DENIES POLISH ULTIMATUM

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) LONDON, April 17.—A report that Poland has sent an ultimatum to Germany and is threatening to send her troops into German territory, was discredited today by Polish officials. They declared the belief that the report had

been put out by the Germans to justify the movements eastward to prevent a military coup.
