WILSON IS RECOVERING NOTICEABLY

 WASHINGTON, April 22.—President Wilson is anxious to remain on the job.

The president has made rapid strides in physical improvement during the last two weeks and has shown such a desire to have full grasp of the control of the administration that it is now doubtful whether he will leave Washington for the summer unless the heat becomes too great. It was learned at the White House today.

The president is appearing better and is in better condition than at any time since his illness. It was learned from Dr. Grayson. The two meetings which the president has held with his cabinet have aroused an enthusiasm for work and he is now doing more of the detail work of the chief executive than he has done at any time since his illness.

That the president is disturbed somewhat by his position in international affairs is not denied although it is learned that he does not worry over it. The fact that the president was largely responsible for the League of Nations and is now unable to force that institution to function as he believes it should function has caused

M'CRAY HAS BIG MEET AT EVANSVILLE

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 22.—Among the many pleasing features of the visit of Warren T. McCray of Kentland, candidate for the republican nomination for governor, to Evansville last week was the interest manifested in his campaign by women who participated actively in the reception held for him at the McCurdy Hotel. They were interested equally with the men in Mr. McCray's successful trip over the First District which his friends now say he will carry by a substantial majority.

At the night meeting in Evansville in honor of Mr. McCray, the first campaign song of the present year in Indiana was sung. It was written by Mrs. E. A. Torrence, of Evansville, who was honored by an appointment as a member of the executive committee of the republican women's state committee, and who is one of the well known women of Indiana.

She composed the following, which was sung to the air of "Keep the Home Fires Burning," which was popular during the recent war: "Keep McCray free burning. Let your thoughts be turning To that important day The fourth of May. Then we'll tell the nation Governor Mac will fill that station. And allay all doubts and fears For the next four years. The entire crowd, which was the largest that has assembled in Evansville this year for a political meeting, joined in the singing.

MANAGERS REFUSE TO EXTEND TIME

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE)
 NEW YORK, April 22.—Refusal of railroad managers to extend the time limits of their ultimatum and take back striking employees without loss of their seniority rights today has further complicated negotiations for the settlement of the "outlaw" railroad strike. Strikers are to meet today in Jersey City to discuss a plan of action.

Edward McHugh, chairman of the executive committee of the railway workers of America, who returned last night from Washington, declared that if the managers persist in their refusal to extend the ultimatum he will not advise the men he represents to return to work. The action of the railroad managers is regarded today as having thrown down the gauntlet to the railroad brotherhoods for a final fight. J. J. Mantel, spokesman for the managers, issued a statement definitely declaring that the basis of the fight arrived at in Wash-

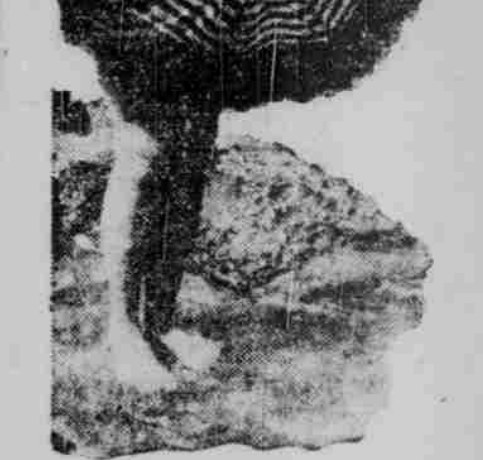
