WHITING H. TO HAVE A BALL TEAM

(SPECIAL TO THE TIMES) WHITING, Ind., April 22.—For the first time in the history of athletics at the Whiting high school, a representative baseball team will take part in the inter-scholastic sports of the school.

Coach Hart is considerably enthused over the large number of candidates who have reported for practice. The reputation long held by W. H. S. as a center of basketball talent will be augmented by the addition of a crack ball club and it is the intention of the school to make Whiting equally famous in both sports.

However, the track team is looked upon as a gloomy prospect for honors in the country track events. The whole team, with the exception of one man, is new to track contests and with a bunch of green material Coach Hart will have to work them hard to make even a fair showing at the first event next Saturday at Morris Park, Hammond, in the triangular meet.

The athletic director is now working on a baseball schedule for the coming season which will include important games with all the schools in the county. Details will be published later.

Wilde Finishes Murray After Taking Count of 2

CAMPDEN, N. J., April 22.—Jimmy Wilde, the great English prize-fighting machine, stopped Bartling Murray, Philadelphia challenger, in the eighth round at the Camden Sportsmen's Club last night. Referee Hovecap stopped the contest with less than a minute to go in the eighth round. Murray's right eye bulged from the socket, his legs were wavy; in short, he was defenseless. Murray looked like a champion in the first round, when he dropped Wilde for a count of two. Murray drove the champion to the ropes with rights and lefts and a right to Wilde's chin, followed by a left hook, sent Wilde on all fours.

K. O. Brown Says Injured Right Thumb Saved Chip

George K. O. Brown returned from New Orleans yesterday and showed a badly injured thumb, sustained in his battle with George Chip Monday night. This injury stopped Brown from scoring a decisive victory over Chip, he says, and made it look to the large crowd that he was not doing his best. Brown crossed his right on Chip's head in the first round and sustained his thumb so severely that he was in pain every time he used his right in the remaining nine rounds. Brown was accused by the referee of not trying, but when he showed his injury to the official after the bout the referee was satisfied that he was mistaken.

With the first triangular meet of the year scheduled for Saturday, hope of victory for Hammond Industrial high school track team took a slump yesterday when it was announced that Theodore Hatfield, whose sturdy legs were slated to cop many points in the track events, would be barred because of a sudden slump in studies. Hatfield was one of the most promising men on the team and the announcement of his ineligibility to enter was received by members of the squad as an omen of defeat. There is hope, however, that he will be permitted to enter the county events at Crown Point, May 8.

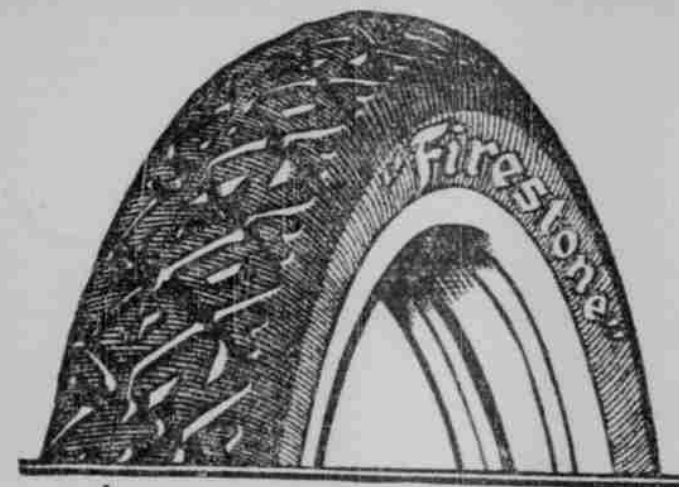

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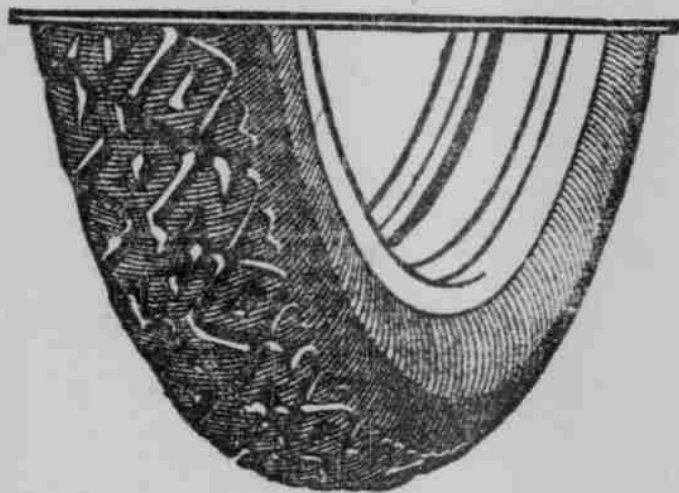
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
