AN ARTISTIC LACING.

The grilling that Senator Capper gave the extortionate profiteer and the conscienceless scoundrels who are manipulating the sugar corner was one long to be remembered. What the Kansas Senator did to the department of justice for permitting these outrages ought to make the present outfit at Washington hunt its hole in a hurry.

Lumber profiteers throughout the country are the cause of millions of homeless people and thousands of wretchedly housed families in all parts of the country. Senator Capper declared in a statement.

An embargo on lumber for export was suggested by Capper "as a means to correct the evil." The forest service has been requested by Senator Capper to furnish figures relative to the sale of lumber, so that "the government will have some basis for action against these profiteers." More power to the Kansas's tongue and arm.

HAS A KNOWLEDGE OF MEN.

"American labor is ninety-five per cent sound to the core," in the opinion of Leonard Wood; but it never is sounder than when it recognizes the claims of Wood for President.

At Gary the leaders of the steel strike found Wood exceedingly human and reasonable. They met him on the same ground, so that the meeting was to the credit and satisfaction of all concerned. Wood said the function of the pickets, as he saw it, was to speak to people, and to try to get others to join them, but that he would not permit any violence, or threats, or any intimidation.

Strike leaders informed Wood that this arrangement was fair and perfectly satisfactory; and that they were glad to have the troops in control, as they thought the strikers would get better treatment from the troops than they had been getting from the local civil authorities.

Wood passed through the ordeal strengthened in the eyes of labor, because he is a man who knows men, like all of the world's great leaders. A knowledge

of men softens many rough places and bridges many difficulties.

THE WORK HABIT.

Europe's restlessness and inability to settle down to peace conditions have been ascribed to the loss of the habit of work during more than four years of war. It is well understood that long continued strain and anxiety are followed by corresponding reaction when the cause of the stress is removed. Those whose nerves were keyed to high pitch for so long naturally relaxed when the war ended.

It would be nearer the truth to say that what was endured unfitted the people for work. When the menace was removed there was collapse, and time alone can restore the nerves to stability and revive fully the ambitions that prevailed in the times of peace. This at least would apply to those who suffered nervous shock because of loss and grief, and there must have been many thousands so afflicted.

In the case of those in the army, withdrawal from their accustomed occupation for an extended period probably would have the effect of making them less eager to resume former effort, and this may be the basis of the allegation that the habit of work is lost. To those who served long, being soldiers became their business, and no doubt their former lines of effort seemed far away and like dreams. Most of us are creatures of routine. We find it easier to move in a groove than to get out of it. Having worn a groove for the habit of steady work it is not very difficult to work steadily. Break that habit for a few months or years and it is hard to get back to old ways.

Possibly that is just what demobilized soldiers abroad are now experiencing. It would be the harder, too, since peace work lacks the excitement, even if devoid of the drudgery and danger, that attends war. In this country those who profited from war wages have shown a disposition to take time to spend some of their accumulations, and probably the same condition prevails abroad.

AN EFFECTIVE REMEDY.

A publication devoted to the abolition of the custom of "tipping" has been launched in Washington with the reported purpose of convincing congress that the practice is an evil that should be forbidden by law.

In all the talk against "tipping" it rarely is recognized that each individual has within himself the power to abolish the practice as far as he is concerned. The trouble with that method of procedure, however, lies in the fact that the average individual may lack courage to do it himself. He wants to be relieved of responsibility for personal action. He recognizes that the waiter or barber or shoe shine who takes a "tip" in addition to the fair price which he is paid for the service, is getting something to which he is not entitled.

We doubt whether any law would entirely eliminate the practice. There are instances where a percentage is added to the bill to cover the "tip" and that is preferable to handing it out after one has paid for the service. An effective remedy, where there is no valid reason for not giving a "tip" is not to do it.
