In making my announcement as a candidate for Senator I deem it my duty to briefly but frankly state the principles upon which I stand, and which will govern my course, if I am elected by your generous suffrages a seat in the Senate of Indiana. These principles compressed into the narrowest compass are as follows:

I declare for state rights and individual liberty. I believe in the support of state sovereignty and local self-government. I am opposed to the National and State Prohibition act, because the people were denied any direct voice in its ratification or rejection, which is an infringement on personal rights.

I am opposed to the present obnoxious Tax Law, and if I am honored with a seat in the senate I will do all in my power to enact a new tax law that will be just and equitable to all taxpayers, whether large or small. I am opposed to the taxation of the poor whose personal property is valued at less than \$500.00. I believe in taxation justly proportioned to such an extent only as is necessary for maintenance of government economically administered.

I favor a just and liberal appropriation to the American Soldiers of the world war, maimed or injured while fighting somewhere in France or upon the high seas to make the world safe for Democracy. I believe that each state should take care of their own. We owe the American Soldier a debt of gratitude that we can never repay.

Labor: The difference from times immemorial between capital and labor lies in the development and acceptance of the sharing of profits. Capital is dependent upon labor and labor upon capital. There must be co-operation between the employer and the employee—harmony must exist for the happiness and prosperity of both.

I believe in and stand for the rule of the people, and I invite all men, who so believe, to stand with me to the end.

RUSSIA IS FACED WITH NEW MENACE

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE)
LONDON, April 29.—With "practical peace" with the allies almost within grasp, a new menace has arisen to confront Soviet Russia and keep her armies busy in many parts of the old empire. A renewal of the war wrangles which has kept Russia in a ferment for the last year either is in progress or is threatened from several sources.

Continuing their great offensive begun Sunday the Poles have bitten deeply into the Red lines, and today's dispatches declared them to have captured

Overstad, 32 miles north and east of Jitmir, which the Poles occupied yesterday. Kersten and smaller towns also were occupied by the Poles in the course of their advance.

An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Vienna today said that the Poles have met and defeated 36 Bolshevik divisions in the course of their advance. Many prisoners and much booty have been captured.

Official advices to the foreign office announced that Polish cavalry units are driving hard toward Kiev. Simultaneously with the Polish drive, the Ukrainians are rising and threatening to divert the forces of Lenin and Trotsky from the more serious menace of the Polish offensive.

It is also learned authoritatively that the "whites" of Petrograd and the Baltic district are attempting to reorganize.

In Western Siberia a new menace has arisen in the shape of the "White Tsaritsa," who are proving exceedingly troublesome for the Moscow government.

In Eastern Siberia, the Japanese have landed additional marines.

RUSSIAN "JOAN OF ARC" ARISES

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE)
LONDON, April 29.—A Russian "Joan of Arc" has arisen in Western Siberia gathered considerable strength and is proving exceedingly troublesome to the Soviet government, according to advices reaching London today.

The newcomer calls herself the "White Tsaritsa" and claims to be a great-grand daughter of Alexander, who reigned from 1801 to 1825.

Like the famous French maid of Orleans, the "White Tsaritsa" dresses in white. Her troops are also clad in white. Her headquarters are at Kirgiz, a town of Western Siberia from which she directs her own operations against Bolshevik outposts and railroads.

The Omsk government is reported to have placed a price of 1,000,000 rubles on her head.
