WIELDS WICKED KNIFE

John Kesser, who lives at 4014 Beach street, Indiana Harbor, wielded a wicked knife last night when he used a butcher knife on Theodore Kaffa, who lives at 3136 Beach street and put Mr. Kaffa in the hospital with cuts which are expected to cause his death. He has several cuts about the face and one bad cut on the side of his neck, which it is believed will prove fatal. He is now at the Mercy hospital in Gary.

The exact cause of the trouble has not been determined but it is thought that the fight started over a woman after "white mule" had been freely imbibed. The fact that Kaffa did not know the name of his assailant or the address at which the cutting took place leads the police to believe that it was no quarrel of former friends. When the police were directed to the house where the fight took place by a woman who had heard Kaffa in-

vited to enter the house they found the door locked and were forced to break open the door before making the arrest. Kesser was found with the butcher knife in his hand and with blood spattered all over him. He also had a deep cut in his left hand which required two stitches.
